With all of our recreation areas open this past holiday weekend we saw more visitors to our project than in many recent years. We are not out of the woods yet for possible high water this summer season but we have certainly started off on the right foot.



KEEPING PUBLIC LAND PUBLIC



In April of 2012 three and one half acres of Corps Fee Title land (government owned land) was renovated from bluegrass back to hardwood trees and shrubs in Pool 18 along the Mississippi River. After years of nearby homeowners encroaching (mowing) on a three acre site near Keithsburg, IL and a one half acre site in New Boston, IL the US Army Corps of Engineers has reclaimed this government fee title ground. The Environmental Stewardship rangers along with the Muscatine field station rangers planted approximately 2,300 trees with the use of a tractor and a 3 pt tree planter.

The ground was being mowed by adjacent homeowners to gain more real estate and a better view of the Mississippi river. This type of mowing encroachment can be a real problem along the river and lead to the general public not utilizing an area because they think they are walking through someone's "backyard" when they are in fact on public ground that everyone should be able to use.

MISSISSIPPI RIVER PROJECT EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT

Mike Back – Engineering Equipment Operator

Mike works for the Mississippi River Project's maintenance crew as an engineering equipment operator. He grew up in Maquoketa, Iowa and has stayed around the area for most of his life. After high school he joined the Navy and served until 1993. Then went on to work in equipment operation at a silica sand mine in Wisconsin. After leaving Wisconsin he returned closer to home and took a job at Wendling Quarry in DeWitt, Iowa before coming onboard with the Corps of Engineers in 2003. He is also part of the Rock Island District Corps of Engineers' dive team that deals with inspection and maintenance on Corps owned structures on the Mississippi River, Illinois River, and all three reservoirs in the District. The dive team is made up of people who are highly trained in working underwater and in low visibility environments. Only a few members of the District can say they have been part of this group who are willing to venture to the depths of the muddy Mississippi and contend the catfish while doing their job. In Mike's free time he spends a lot of time outdoors and enjoys watching sports, riding motorcycle, and snowmobiling.



IOWA STATE UNIVERSITY TURTLE CAMP RETURNS TO THOMSON CAUSEWAY FOR 25TH YEAR



If you have ever spent time in the Thomson Causeway Recreation Area in early spring than you have certainly noticed the orange flags scattered all over Potters Marsh South Camping Loop. This spring marks the 25th Anniversary for Dr. Fred Janzen, of Iowa State University, and his students in the campground collecting data used for documenting turtle nesting.

Dr. Janzen and his students work around the clock to record turtle nesting activity as it occurs. You can spot them collecting turtles, counting eggs and covering nests with steel mesh to protect the eggs from predators. This Saturday June 2nd Dr. Janzen will be hosting a Campground program beginning at

7:00pm at the Thomson Causeway Amphitheatre where he will discuss what he has learned over the last 25 years.

BICYCLE TOUR OF HISTORIC ARSENAL ISLAND

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Mississippi River Project announces that the Visitor Center at Locks and Dam #15 will be providing a guided bicycle tour of historic Arsenal Island.

Did you know that the town of Davenport was named after a murdered Colonel, or that hundreds of people died while in prison on the Island? The answers to these questions and many more may be found on this relaxing informational ride.

This six-mile ride will be held on Saturday, June 2nd from 9:30-11:30am. Historic points of interest that the tour will ride by include: the Colonel Davenport Home, the old Moline Lock, RI Arsenal Quarters #1, the Confederate Cemetery, and many more. The tour will begin and end at the Mississippi River Visitor Center located on the western end of Arsenal Island at Locks and Dam #15. This tour is free of charge and is limited to 15 bicyclists. Advance registration is required. Helmets are mandatory. An adult must accompany children under 12 years of age. No training wheels are allowed.

The MRCC partners (Federal and State agencies working with non-governmental organizations) are striving to provide Americans and visitors from around the world with opportunities to experience the Mississippi River through recreational and stewardship programs. SOCIETY OF AMERICAN FORESTERS MEETING



Illinois and Iowa state chapters of Society of American Foresters (SAF) held a spring meeting in Quincy, IL on May 3rd and 4th. The joint chapter SAF meeting had a main focus in floodplain forest dynamics and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (COE) timber management of floodplain forest on the Mississippi River in Rock Island District. Attendees arrived at the COE campground, Bear Creek, and began their trip to six

field site locations on Long Island and Ward Island. At these field sites, SAF members were informed of cooperative management on COE property with the Fish and Wildlife Service and the state agencies of Wisconsin, Illinois, Iowa, and Missouri. SAF members had the chance to view tree plantings, forest management sites, and timber harvests. Transportation to and from locations by boat gave everyone a firsthand experience and reference to challenges with working on the Mississippi River. Presenting information and providing transportation for the field tour portion of the meeting included COE Natural Resource Specialists from St. Louis and Rock Island Districts, Fish and Wildlife Service, and Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Attending the meeting included

federal employees, state foresters, private land owners, university professors, and college students, 50 members in total. Foresters and individuals came from six different states to attend this meeting; Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, New York, Tennessee, and Indiana. Of those attending, two foresters are currently National SAF District Council Representatives and one immediate past President of SAF.
