The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Rock Island District (District) is writing to inform you of an upcoming Habitat Rehabilitation and Enhancement Project (Project) at Green Island Wildlife Management Area (WMA) at the confluence of the Maquoketa and Mississippi Rivers in Jackson County, Iowa. The identification and evaluation of historic properties and determinations of effect will not be completed prior to the completion of the environmental assessment needed for compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), making the execution of a Programmatic Agreement (Agreement) for this Project an appropriate course of action, pursuant to 36 CFR 800.14(b)(1)(ii). The District greatly values your participation and input, inviting your agency to participate as a consulting party and signatory in a forthcoming Agreement as per 36 CFR 800.14(b)(1)(ii).

Federal Undertaking

Pursuant to the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA) of 1966, as amended, and its implementing regulations, 36 CFR Part 800, the District determined the planned project (Project) has the potential to cause effects to historic properties [36 CFR 800.3(a)] and as a consequence required a determination of effect within the Area of Potential Effect (APE).

Area of Potential Effect (APE)

The Green Island Project area is a 4,000-acre managed wetland complex that includes shallow lakes, emergent vegetation, managed moist soil areas, and braided channels surrounded by degrading riparian timber, located in Pool 13 of the Upper Mississippi River (UMR) below the confluence of the Maquoketa River along the right descending bank between river miles (RMs) 548.5 and 546.0. The Project features will be located entirely in the Green Island WMA and managed by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IA DNR). All Project lands are in Federal fee title ownership by the District and are managed via cooperative agreement between the District and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) as part of the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife and Fish Refuge (NWFR).

The District has determined that, for purposes of Section 106 of the NHPA, the Federal undertaking encompasses permanent and temporary access routes, equipment staging areas, aquatic diversity dredging and dredge material placement areas, topographic diversity measures, timber stand improvement, and the footprint of the planned construction for water control features. The APE boundaries will not change as the project progresses; however, the footprint of various direct effects may change as the placement of specific features is refined within the APE. Some specific project features, including design and execution of the timber stand improvements, are not currently known. However, the types of actions to be performed and their potential impacts will all be included in the Agreement.

Project Justification

The Green Island HREP is an ecosystem restoration Project developed through the Upper Mississippi River Restoration (UMRR) Program. The UMRR Program, authorized by the Water Resources Development Act (WRDA) of 1986 under Section 1103 and extended indefinitely by the WRDA of 1999, is a Federal/State partnership program for planning, construction, and evaluation of fish and wildlife habitat rehabilitation Projects and for monitoring the natural resources of the river system. The UMRR Program is a regional program that includes the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' (Corps) St. Paul, Rock Island, and St. Louis Districts. The purpose of the rehabilitation projects portion of the UMRR Program is to preserve and restore habitat on the Mississippi and Illinois floodplain river systems. The scope of the current Project consists of an approved feasibility study with an integrated environmental assessment, plans and specifications (P&S) design, and construction of the Green Island HREP.

Historic Properties Identification

The District conducted an archival search for historic properties by querying the I-Sites Online GIS and Database for Iowa Archaeology and the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) database for standing, buried, or submerged historic properties potentially affected by this project. No submerged or standing historic properties eligible for NRHP listing are documented within the APE.

The Project area has not been entirely surveyed for buried cultural resources. The boundaries of those surveys that have been completed to date are depicted in the attached map labeled Enclosure 2. Due to the size of the remaining unsurveyed portions of the project area, a phased identification approach utilizing cultural and geomorphological assessments will be employed as plans for feature designs and placement are developed. The potential for effect to historic properties of any future plans will be reviewed by the District and coordinated with the consulting parties prior to construction as per the stipulations of the Agreement.

This Agreement will be included in an appendix of the final National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) document, the Environmental Assessment (EA) as per 36 CFR 800.8. The draft EA will be available for public review. Evidence of this Agreement will be included in the draft EA.

Consulting Parties Invitation

The District would like to identify any concerns and reach mutually agreeable decisions while taking into account the interests of Tribal, state, and Federal governments and other consulting parties for all future courses of action, including development of the Agreement. Section 7 Consultation

Section 7 of the Endangered Species Act of 1973 requires that actions authorized, funded, or carried out by Federal agencies not jeopardize federally threatened or endangered species or adversely modify designated critical habitat. To fulfill this mandate, Federal agencies (or their designated non-federal representative) must consult with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) if they determine their project "may affect" listed species or designated critical habitat. Under the ESA, it is the responsibility of the Federal action agency or its designated representative to determine if a proposed action may affect endangered, threatened, or proposed species, or designated critical habitat, and if so, to consult with the Service further. Similarly, it is the responsibility of the Federal action agency or project proponent, not the Service to make "no effect" determinations. If you determine that your proposed action will have

no effect on threatened or endangered species or their respective designated critical habitat, you do not need to seek concurrence with the Service.

No Effect Determinations for Listed Species

- 1. - 2. - 4. Adequacy of Information & Surveys Agencies may base their determinations on the best evidence that is available or can be developed during consultation. Agencies must give the benefit of any doubt to the species when there are any inadequacies in the information. Inadequacies may include uncertainty in any step of the analysis. To provide adequate information on which to base a determination, it may be appropriate to conduct surveys to determine whether listed species or their habitats are present in the action area. Please contact our office for more information or see the survey guidelines that the Service has made available in IPaC.

May Effect Determinations for Listed Species

 If the species habitat is present within the action area and survey data is unavailable or inconclusive: assume the species is present or plan and implement surveys and interpret results in coordination with our office. If assuming species present or surveys for the species are positive continue with the may affect determination process. May affect, with respect to a species, is the appropriate conclusion when a species might be exposed to a consequence of a federal action and could respond to that exposure. For critical habitat,

- 'may affect' is the appropriate conclusion if the action area overlaps with mapped areas of critical habitat and an essential physical or biological feature may be exposed to a consequence of a federal action and could change in response to that exposure.
- 2. Identify stressors or effects to the species and to the essential physical and biological features of critical habitat that overlaps with the action area. Consider all consequences of the action and assess the potential for each life stage of the species that occurs in the action area to be exposed to the stressors. Deconstruct the action into its component parts to be sure that you do not miss any part of the action that could cause effects to the species or physical and biological features of critical habitat. Stressors that affect species' resources may have consequences even if the species is not present when the project is implemented.
- 3. If no listed or proposed species will be exposed to stressors caused by the action, a 'no effect' determination may be appropriate be sure to separately assess effects to critical habitat, if any overlaps with the action area. If you determined that the proposed action or other activities that are caused by the proposed action may affect a species or critical habitat, the next step is to describe the manner in which they will respond or be altered. Specifically, to assess whether the species/critical habitat is "not likely to be adversely affected" or "likely to be adversely affected."
- 4. Determine how the habitat or the resource will respond to the proposed action (for example, changes in habitat quality, quantity, availability, or distribution), and assess how the species is expected to respond to the effects to its habitat or other resources. Critical habitat analyses focus on how the proposed action will affect the physical and biological features of the critical habitat in the action area. If there will be only beneficial effects or the effects of the action are expected to be insignificant or discountable, conclude "may affect, not likely to adversely affect" and submit your finding and supporting rationale to our office and request concurrence.
- 5. If you cannot conclude that the effects of the action will be wholly beneficial, insignificant, or discountable, check IPaC for species-specific Section 7 guidance and conservation measures to determine whether there are any measures that may be implemented to avoid or minimize the negative effects. If you modify your proposed action to include conservation measures, assess how inclusion of those measures will likely change the effects of the action. If you cannot conclude that the effects of the action will be wholly beneficial, insignificant, or discountable, contact our office for assistance.
- 6. Letters with requests for consultation or correspondence about your project should include the Consultation Tracking Number in the header. Electronic submission is preferred.

Northern Long-eared Bat Update

Please note that on March 23, 2022, the Service published a proposal to reclassify the northern long-eared bat (NLEB) as endangered under the Endangered Species Act. The U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia has ordered the Service to complete a new final listing determination for the NLEB by November 2022 (Case 1:15-cv-00477, March 1, 2021). The bat, currently listed as threatened, faces extinction due to the range-wide impacts of white-nose syndrome (WNS), a deadly fungal disease affecting cave-dwelling bats across the continent. The proposed reclassification, if finalized, would remove the current 4(d) rule for the NLEB, as these rules may be applied only to threatened species. Depending on the type of effects a project has on NLEB, the change in the species' status may trigger the need to re-initiate consultation for any actions that are not completed and for which the Federal action agency retains discretion once the new listing determination becomes effective (anticipated to occur by December 30, 2022). If your project may result in incidental take of NLEB after the new listing goes into effect this will first need to addressed in an updated consultation that includes an Incidental Take Statement. If your project may require re-initiation of consultation, please contact our office for additional guidance.

Other Trust Resources and Activities

Bald and Golden Eagles

Although no longer protected under the Endangered Species Act, be aware that bald eagles are protected under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act and Migratory Bird Treaty Act, as are golden eagles. Projects affecting these species may require measures to avoid harming eagles or may require a permit. If your project is near an eagle nest or winter roost area, please contact our office for further coordination. 

A taller bar indicates a higher probability of species presence. The survey effort (see below) can be used to establish a level of confidence in the presence score. One can have higher confidence in the presence score if the corresponding survey effort is also high.

How is the probability of presence score calculated? The calculation is done in three steps:

- 1. The probability of presence for each week is calculated as the number of survey events in the week where the species was detected divided by the total number of survey events for that week. For example, if in week 12 there were 20 survey events and the Spotted Towhee was found in 5 of them, the probability of presence of the Spotted Towhee in week 12 is 0.25.
- 2. To properly present the pattern of presence across the year, the relative probability of presence is calculated. This is the probability of presence divided by the maximum probability of presence across all weeks. For example, imagine the probability of presence in week 20 for the Spotted Towhee is 0.05, and that the probability of presence at week 12 (0.25) is the maximum of any week of the year. The relative probability of presence on week 12 is 0.25/0.25 = 1; at week 20 it is 0.05/0.25 = 0.2.
- 3. The relative probability of presence calculated in the previous step undergoes a statistical conversion so that all possible values fall between 0 and 10, inclusive. This is the probability of presence score.

Yellow bars denote a very liberal estimate of the time-frame inside which the bird breeds across its entire range. If there are no yellow bars shown for a bird, it does not breed in your project area.

Survey Effort (|)

Vertical black lines superimposed on probability of presence bars indicate the number of surveys performed for that species in the 10km grid cell(s) your project area overlaps. The number of surveys is expressed as a range, for example, 33 to 64 surveys.





Tell me more about conservation measures I can implement to avoid or minimize impacts to migratory birds.

<u>Nationwide Conservation Measures</u> describes measures that can help avoid and minimize impacts to all birds at any location year round. Implementation of these measures is particularly important when birds are most likely to occur in the project area. When birds may be breeding in the area, identifying the locations of any active nests and avoiding their destruction is a very helpful impact minimization measure. To see when birds are most likely to occur and be breeding in your project area, view the Probability of Presence Summary. <u>Additional measures</u> or <u>permits</u>

may be advisable depending on the type of activity you are conducting and the type of infrastructure or bird species present on your project site.

What does IPaC use to generate the list of migratory birds that potentially occur in my specified location?

The Migratory Bird Resource List is comprised of USFWS <u>Birds of Conservation Concern</u> (<u>BCC</u>) and other species that may warrant special attention in your project location.

The migratory bird list generated for your project is derived from data provided by the <u>Avian Knowledge Network (AKN)</u>. The AKN data is based on a growing collection of <u>survey</u>, <u>banding</u>, <u>and citizen science datasets</u> and is queried and filtered to return a list of those birds reported as occurring in the 10km grid cell(s) which your project intersects, and that have been identified as warranting special attention because they are a BCC species in that area, an eagle (<u>Eagle Act</u> requirements may apply), or a species that has a particular vulnerability to offshore activities or development.

If a bird on your migratory bird species list has a breeding season associated with it, if that bird does occur in your project area, there may be nests present at some point within the timeframe specified. If "Breeds elsewhere" is indicated, then the bird likely does not breed in your project area.

What are the levels of concern for migratory birds?

Migratory birds delivered through IPaC fall into the following distinct categories of concern:

1. "BCC Rangewide" birds are <u>Birds of Conservation Concern</u> (BCC) that are of concern throughout their range anywhere within the USA (including Hawaii, the Pacific Islands, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands);

- 2. "BCC BCR" birds are BCCs that are of concern only in particular Bird Conservation Regions (BCRs) in the continental USA; and
- 3. "Non-BCC Vulnerable" birds are not BCC species in your project area, but appear on your list either because of the Eagle Act requirements (for eagles) or (for non-eagles) potential susceptibilities in offshore areas from certain types of development or activities (e.g. offshore energy development or longline fishing).

Although it is important to try to avoid and minimize impacts to all birds, efforts should be made, in particular, to avoid and minimize impacts to the birds on this list, especially eagles and BCC species of rangewide concern. 





We have received your April 18 2022 submission regarding the above-referenced federal undertaking and provide the following response.

Provisions of the National Historic Preservation Act and the Advisory Council's rules implementing section 106 mandate the participation of the State Historic Preservation Office in such consultations and designate the SHPO as a required signatory to any legal agreements resulting therefrom.

Owing to current and anticipated case loads, SHPO staff asks at least a two week notice when scheduling meetings; and, that all documents to be considered during consultation meetings be submitted a month in advance so that our staff has adequate opportunity to complete a review and prepare comments.

Finally, be aware that once a final draft has been agreed upon by the consulting parties, the final draft must be reviewed and vetted by the Iowa Attorney General's Office prior to execution by the Iowa SHPO.

We ask that project proponents take these factors into consideration when outlining their timeline for consultation and project planning.

We look forward to receiving additional information in the future as the consultation unfolds.

PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE UNITED STATES ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS, ROCK ISLAND DISTRICT, AND THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICE REGARDING THE GREEN ISLAND HABITAT REHABILITATION AND ENHANCEMENT PROJECT, JACKSON COUNTY, IOWA

WHEREAS, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Rock Island District (District) is proposing a habitat rehabilitation and enhancement project (Project) in Pool 13 of the Upper Mississippi River, in Jackson County, Iowa (Appendix A). Areas considered as part of this Project and described as the Project area include the Green Island Wildlife Management Area; and,

WHEREAS, the District has determined the proposed Project constitutes an Undertaking subject to the requirements of 36 CFR Part 800, the regulations implementing Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA; 54 USC § 306108); and,

WHEREAS, the District has determined that the proposed Project is the type of Undertaking that has the potential to affect historic properties listed in or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), and therefore will consult with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), the Iowa State Historic Preservation Officer (IA SHPO), the Illinois State Historic Preservation Officer (IL SHPO), Indian tribes, the Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist (IA OSA), and other Interested and Consulting Parties (Appendix B) pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.14(b) of the regulations implementing Section 106 of the NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 306108) and Section 110(f) of the same Act (54 U.S.C. § 306107); and,

WHEREAS, the identification and evaluation of historic properties and determinations of effect will not be completed prior to the completion of the environmental document needed for compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), making execution of this Programmatic Agreement (PA) for the Project appropriate pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.14(b)(1)(ii); and,

WHEREAS, in recognition of the unique government-to-government relationship between the Federal government and the Indian tribes, the District will notify the tribes (Appendix B) of the Undertaking, and of the potential for effects that the Undertaking may have upon historic properties which may be of particular interest to them, and has invited the tribes to participate as concurring parties to this agreement, with no tribes responding in the affirmative; and,

WHEREAS, the USFWS, has declined to participate as a Signatory to this PA due to the fact that the Undertaking will occur only on Federal fee title lands under the District's jurisdiction; and,

WHEREAS, the District has not fully determined the scope of activity and Area of Potential Effect (APE) for the Undertaking (Appendix A) but will consult with the Signatories and Consulting Parties in a timely manner prior to implementation in order to determine the APE for all of the actions subject to the terms of this agreement, and shall propose and document modifications to the APE throughout the duration of this PA in accordance with the stipulations of this PA; and,

WHEREAS, the District shall seek and consider the views of the public and shall provide information to the public about the Undertaking and its effects on historic properties following agency procedures pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.2(d); and in a manner that observes confidentiality requirements pursuant to Section 304 of the Act and applicable state laws; and,

WHEREAS, the District has not fully determined the scope of activity and Area of Potential Effect (APE) for the Undertaking (Appendix A) but will consult with the Signatories and Consulting Parties in a timely manner prior to implementation in order to determine the APE for all of the actions subject to the terms of this agreement, and shall propose and document modifications to the APE throughout the duration of this PA in accordance with the stipulations of this PA; and,

WHEREAS, the District shall seek and consider the views of the public and shall provide information to the public about the Undertaking and its effects on historic properties following agency procedures pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.2(d); and in a manner that observes confidentiality requirements pursuant to Section 304 of the Act and applicable state laws; and,

WHEREAS, the parties to this agreement have agreed to certain programmatic mitigation measures (Appendix E) but in so doing also recognize that not all effects can be mitigated programmatically and therefore have agreed to re-enter consultation in order to devise appropriate remedial measures when the need arises; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1), the District has notified the ACHP and IA SHPO of this PA. The IA SHPO, having completed consultation in accordance to procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800 for that portion of the Undertaking that falls within Iowa's jurisdiction, and the ACHP having chosen not to participate in the consultation pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1)(iii);

NOW, THEREFORE, the District, and the IA SHPO (hereinafter Signatories), agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations of this PA to satisfy the District's Section 106 responsibilities for the Undertaking.

The District shall ensure that the following stipulations of this PA are carried out:

I. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- **A.** The Signatories to this PA are the District and the IA SHPO. Collectively, the Signatories, and Concurring Parties are referred to in this PA as "Parties". The Signatories and the Concurring Parties have rights as defined under 36 CFR § 800.6.
- **B.** The District is responsible for oversight of performance under this PA and shall carry out compliance with Section 106 of the NHPA, including leading consultation as it pertains to identification and evaluation of historic properties and findings of effect.
- **C.** The District's consultants shall provide to the District completed cultural resource reports with fully documented eligibility determination recommendations and other requirements as noted in the contractual work order statement.
- **D.** Unanticipated Discoveries (Appendix C), Historic Properties Identification and Procedures for Project Review (Appendix D), Programmatic Mitigation of Effects (Appendix E) are detailed in the appendices as listed.

II. THE DISTRICT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- **A.** The District shall serve as the principal authority in matters concerning the interpretation of this agreement, its appendices, and the routine execution of its terms, all subject to the Dispute Resolution (see Stipulation VII). The District, at its discretion, may consult directly with the IA SHPO and ACHP.
- **B.** The District shall ensure that the procedures for Project-specific consultation, historic properties identification and evaluation, assessment of effects, mitigation of adverse effects, and treatment of historic properties are implemented in accordance with procedures outlined in Appendices D and E.
- **C.** The District shall ensure that all historic properties investigations, evaluations, treatment plans, and data recovery efforts devised and conducted pursuant to this agreement shall be performed by or under the direct supervision of an individual that meets the Secretary of the Interior's Qualifications Standards (36 CFR Part 61); and, shall be performed in a manner that is consistent with Secretary of the Interior's Standards and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa*, and all other Federal or State standards as appropriate.
- **D.** The District shall ensure that documentation submitted to IA SHPO for review meets the standards outlined at 36 CFR 800.11. Pursuant to Section 304 of the NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 307103), the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA; 5 U.S.C. § 552), the District shall withhold from disclosure to the public information relating to the location or character of historic resources when, in consultation with the lowa State Archaeologist, it has been determined that disclosure of such information may create a substantial risk of harm, theft, or destruction to such resources or to the area or

place where such resources are located, to the extent such withholding is authorized under the FOIA and other Federal laws applicable to the District, or unless directed to release such information by Court Order.

- **E.** The District shall ensure that all archeological reports resulting from actions pursuant to this agreement shall be consistent with the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa*, and to the Department of the Interior's Format Standards for Final Reports of Data Recovery Programs (42 FR 5377-79). Precise location data should be provided only in a separate appendix if it appears that release of such data could jeopardize archeological deposits.
- **F.** The District shall invite the participation of consulting parties in all activities authorized under this agreement as listed in Appendix B. (Note: The District must invite tribal consultation for all activities, even those excluded by regulation or agreement from IA SHPO review, unless a previous arrangement with individual or united tribes has been made). Parties that have a consultative role in the Section 106 process include, but are not limited to, the following: federally-recognized Indian tribes; representatives of local governments; county and municipal historic preservation commissions including those established under the Certified Local Governments program; the public; the National Trust for Historic Preservation; the Preservation lowa organization; and individuals and organizations who, due to the nature of their legal or economic relation to the Undertaking or their concern with the Undertaking's effects on historic properties, demonstrate a legitimate interest.
- **G.** The District shall ensure that artifacts, samples, and associated materials (ecofacts) recovered during data recovery mitigation from federally-owned lands shall be curated, along with all associated records, at the District's regional curation facility in the Illinois State Museum that meets standards established in 36 CFR 79, all shall ensure reasonable availability to future professional and academic research.

III. THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

- The IA SHPO shall comment on all activities designated for its review in a timely and efficient manner and in accordance with procedures outlined in Appendices C, D, and E.
 - IV. UNANTICIPATED DISCOVERIES

- The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix C are observed in the
- event that human remains, non-mortuary archeological material, and architectural
- properties are encountered during construction or archaeological investigations.

V. HISTORIC PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION AND PROJECT REVIEW

The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix D are observed for all cultural resource investigations, historic properties identification, and project review.

VI. PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix E are observed in the event that the Project will have an adverse effect on historic properties.

VII. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

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- **A.** Should any signatory or concurring party to this PA object at any time to any actions proposed or the manner in which the terms of this agreement are implemented, the District shall consult with such party to resolve the objection. If the District determines that such objection cannot be resolved:
- 1. The District will forward all documentation relevant to the dispute, including the District's proposed resolution, to the ACHP. The ACHP shall provide the District with its advice on the resolution of the objection within 30 days of receiving adequate documentation. Prior to reaching a final decision on the dispute, the District shall prepare a written response that takes into account any timely advice or comments regarding the dispute from the ACHP, signatories and concurring parties, and provide them with a copy of this written response. The District will then proceed according to its final decision.
- **2.** If the ACHP does not provide its advice regarding the dispute within the 30-day time period, the District may make a final decision on the dispute and proceed accordingly. Prior to reaching such a final decision, the District shall prepare a written response that takes into account any timely comments regarding the dispute from the signatories and concurring parties to the Agreement and provide them and the ACHP with a copy of such written response.
- **3.** The District's responsibility to carry out all other actions subject to the terms of this PA that are not subject of the dispute remain unchanged.
- **B.** If the District and the IA SHPO and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, do not agree on NRHP eligibility, or if the Signatories, ACHP, or the National Park Service so request, the District will request a formal determination of eligibility from the Keeper of the NRHP, National Park Service, whose determination shall be final.

VIII. DURATION

- This agreement will become void if its terms are not carried out within five years from the date of its execution. Six months prior to the fifth anniversary of the agreement execution date, the District shall consult with the other signatories to reconsider the
- terms of the agreement and amend it in accordance with Stipulation X, Amendments.
- The terms of this Agreement shall remain in-force for a period of five years commencing
- at the date of its execution. At the end of this period the District shall review the
- 201 necessity of this Agreement in order to determine whether it should be reissued or
- allowed to expire. If the Agreement requires reissue, the District shall consult with the IA
- SHPO in order to ensure compliance with the most current version of the Federal
- regulations (36 CFR Part 800) implementing Sections 106 and 110(f) of the NHPA (54

U.S.C. § 306108 and 306107). Extension of this agreement duration requires written

amendment by all Signatories.

IX. TERMINATION

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- 208 Any of the Signatories to this PA may request a reconsideration of its terms or revoke
- the agreement upon written notification to the other Signatories by providing 30 days'
- 210 notice to the other Signatories, provided that the Signatories will consult during the
- 211 period prior to termination to seek agreement on amendments or other actions that
- would avoid termination. In the advent of termination, the District will comply with 36
- 213 CFR 800.3 through 800.7 with regard to individual actions covered by this PA.

X. AMENDMENTS

- 215 Any of the Signatories to this PA may request that any or all of its articles be amended
- subsequent to the PA's execution, whereupon the other Signatories will consult in
- accordance with 36 CFR 800.13, to consider such amendment. The District must notify
- 218 the ACHP of its intent to amend the Agreement and invite the ACHP's review and
- comment. The amendment will be effective on the date a copy signed by all of the
- Signatories is filed with the ACHP. The District shall ensure that copies of the amended
- 221 Agreement are provided to all of the signatories. The District shall follow the above
- 222 procedures for amendment in the event that the Undertaking is redefined by the
- selection of a different alternative or through the adoption of multiple alternatives.
- Revisions to the appendices shall not require notification of and review by the ACHP.
- The appendices to the PA can be changed by written concurrence by the District and
- 226 the IA SHPO. However, the District shall ensure that the ACHP and consulting parties
- are provided file copies of finalized versions that reflect all revisions.

228 XI. ANTI-DEFICIENCY ACT

- The parties to this agreement acknowledge the District's fiduciary responsibilities
- pursuant to the Anti-Deficiency Act (31 USC § 1341). This notwithstanding, the District's
- responsibilities to fulfill the terms of this agreement and to comply with the requirements
- of the NHPA remain unchanged regardless of the availability or level of funding
- 233 appropriated for its purposes.

XII. EXECUTION OF THE AGREEMENT

- This agreement will become effective upon the District's receipt of signatures on this
- agreement by all Signatories. Execution of this agreement by the District and the IA
- 237 SHPO and the implementation of its terms evidence that the District has taken into
- account program effects on historic properties and has afforded the ACHP an
- 239 opportunity to comment.

Figure 2. Project Feature Concepts and Area of Potential Effect




Figure 3. Previous Cultural Surveys Intersecting with the Green Island APE

APPENDIX C

UNANTICIPATED DISCOVERY

Here, and throughout Appendix C, actions taken pursuant to this agreement will occur in consultation with the Signatories and Consulting Parties.

- **A. Human Remains.** lowa law protects all human remains regardless of their historical age, sex, or cultural/ethnic affiliation.
- 1. In the event that human remains are encountered during archeological investigations or construction activities, work shall cease within 100 feet of the remains, appropriate steps shall be taken to secure the site, and officials at the District, the Bioarchaeology Program at the Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist (IA OSA), and the IA SHPO shall be notified and, to the best of their ability, shall respond within three (3) working days to such notification in order to determine the next course of action that ensures the applicable Iowa law is followed. At the District, this official shall be an Archeologist in the Environmental Compliance or Planning branches, or their designee. At the IA OSA, this official shall be the Bioarchaeology Program Director or their designee. At the IA SHPO, this official shall be a Review Archaeologist.
- **2.** If the remains appear to be ancient (i.e., older than 150 years), and are determined to be ethnically Native American, the District shall be responsible for adhering to the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act [NAGPRA (P.L. 101-601; 25 U.S.C. 3001-3013;104 Stat. 3048-3058)]. The IA OSA shall have jurisdiction to ensure that the appropriate procedures in accordance with applicable lowa law (Code of Iowa, Sections 263B, 523I.316.6 and 716.5; IAC 685, Ch.11.1) are observed, but are not financially responsible for costs incurred during this process. The disposition of the remains will be arranged in accordance with NAGPRA and Chapter 263B of the Iowa Code.
- 3. Human remains less than 150 years old that are determined to be ethnically Native American are protected under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (P.L. 101-601; 25 USC 3001-3013) and Chapter 523I of the Iowa Code. The District shall be responsible for adhering to these laws. In the event that human remains appearing less than 150 years in age are encountered, the District shall ensure that appropriate law enforcement authorities and the Iowa Department of Health be notified. The IA OSA shall ensure that appropriate procedures in accordance with applicable Iowa law are observed but are not financially responsible for costs incurred during this process.
- **4.** Before work can resume within 100 feet of the human remains, the District must determine the NRHP eligibility of the archeological resource in consultation with the IA SHPO and tribal representatives, as applicable.
- **5.** Upon a determination of eligibility, and decision to preserve in place by the IA OSA, or designee, the District shall submit a plan for avoidance and protection to the District for review and comment. The District will provide the proposed plan to all

- Consulting Parties. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven (7) working days to provide comments to the IA OSA on the proposed plan for final approval.
- 6. Upon a determination of eligibility, and decision to remove the human remains by the IA OSA, or their designee, the District shall submit a plan for relocation and recovery of information to the District for review and comment. The District will provide the proposed plan to all Consulting Parties. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven (7) working days to provide comments to the IA OSA on the proposed plan for final approval.
- 7. Work within 100 feet of the human remains shall resume upon the
 development and implementation of an appropriate relocation and data recovery
 plan, other recommended mitigation procedures, or agreement among the District, IA
 OSA and IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation.
- **B. Archaeological Material (non-mortuary related).** The District shall ensure that the following procedures are observed in the event that previously undetected non-mortuary-related archeological materials are encountered.

- 1. All activities within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall cease immediately, appropriate steps shall be implemented to secure the site, and the District and IA SHPO shall be notified of the discovery and shall respond within five working days to such notification. Construction work may continue in the area outside the 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery.
- **2.** An archeologist retained by the District will inspect the work site and determine the extent of the affected archeological resource within five working days of its discovery.
- **3.** Before work can resume within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery, the District must determine the NRHP eligibility of the archeological resource in consultation with the IA SHPO and other Consulting Parties, as applicable.
- **4.** Upon a determination of eligibility, the District or their designee shall submit a plan for avoidance, protection, recovery of information, or destruction without data recovery to the District for review and comment within 20 working days. The District will notify all Consulting Parties of the unanticipated discovery and provide the proposed treatment plan for their consideration. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven working days to provide comments on the proposed treatment plan upon receipt of the information.
 - **5.** Work within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall resume upon either:
- **a.** The development and implementation of an appropriate data recovery plan, other recommended mitigation procedures, or agreement among the District and the IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation; or,
 - **b.** Agreement by the IA SHPO and the District that the newly located

archeological materials are not eligible for inclusion on the NRHP.

- c. If the District and IA SHPO object to any part of the treatment plan and they are not able to reach resolution of the objection within seven working days of when the objection is raised, the District shall follow the procedures outlined in Stipulation VII of the PA, *Dispute Resolution*.
- **C. Adverse Effects upon Architectural Properties.** The District shall ensure that the following procedures are observed in the event that post-review effects to historic buildings, structures, objects, or districts are identified.
 - 1. Work within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall cease and the District shall notify the IA SHPO of the discovery and the IA SHPO will respond within five working days to such notification. Construction work may continue in the area outside the 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery.
- 2. An architectural historian retained by the District will inspect the work site and evaluate the National Register eligibility of the property within seven working days.

 The District, in consultation with the District, shall assess the project effects. The District shall provide its report of findings and determination of effect to the IA SHPO who shall have seven working days to provide comments.
 - **3.** Upon assessment of adverse effect, the District shall submit a plan for after-the-fact mitigation to the District for review and comment. The District will notify all Consulting Parties of the unanticipated discovery and provide the plan for their consideration. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven working days to provide comments on the plan upon its receipt. The District may implement the plan if IA SHPO fails to respond within the allotted timeframe.
 - **4.** Work within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall resume upon either:
 - **a.** Agreement by the District and the IA SHPO that the effects are not adverse; or,
 - **b.** The development and implementation of an appropriate plan, or agreement among the District and the IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation.
 - **c.** If the District and IA SHPO object to any part of the plan and they are not able to reach resolution of the objection within seven working days of when the objection is raised, the District shall follow the procedures outlined in Stipulation VII, *Dispute Resolution.*
 - **D. Failure to Act within Specified Timeframe.** If any principal signatory fails to meet the timeframes set in Appendix C, *Unanticipated Discoveries*, the District may proceed to final decision-making.

APPENDIX D

HISTORIC PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION AND PROCEDURES FOR PROJECT REVIEW

I. HISTORIC PROPERTY SURVEYS AND TESTING

Here, and throughout Appendix D, actions taken pursuant to this agreement will occur in consultation with the Signatories. The District will make a reasonable and good faith effort to identify historic properties that are within the Area of Potential Effect (APE) and provide this information, and associated studies or reports to the Signatories. This shall be accomplished through the implementation of historic property surveys and testing and agreed upon treatments of historic properties. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will ensure that the following measures are implemented:

A. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will provide scholarly evidence of stewardship (typically documented in a technical report written by a qualified archeologist or architectural historian) in the recordation, protection, and management of historic properties within the APE through systemic research and studies which have been finalized and approved, then placed in the permanent files of the IA SHPO and IA OSA (as necessary) as evidence of compliance promulgated under Section 106 of the NHPA, as amended and its implementing regulations 36 C.F.R. Part 800: "Protection of Historic Properties."

B. No archeological historic property survey will be required where the District has documented and IA SHPO concurs that:

1. Profound ground surface disturbances have so completely altered the landform as to make the existence of historic properties impossible (e.g., complete stripping of all soils down to sterile subsoil); or,

2. Geomorphological investigations indicate deeply buried deposits deeper than project impacts or very low potential for near surface cultural deposits; or,

 3. An area previously has been surveyed at the appropriate level of investigation necessary to cover the entire APE utilizing methods consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation* (48 FR 44720-23) and taking into account the National Park Service publication *The Archaeological Survey: Methods and Uses* (1978) and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2018) and has been recommended for acceptance by the IA SHPO.

C. The District will ensure that the necessary surveys are performed on all other areas within the APE indirectly and directly affected by the Undertaking. The District will evaluate historic properties relative to past surveys and reports and properties deemed ineligible with IA SHPO's concurrence based upon the evaluation of the most recent survey; surveys occurring within the last five years that have been

recommended for acceptance by the IA SHPO and provide full vertical and horizontal coverage of the APE will not be reevaluated. If a survey results in the identification of properties that are eligible to the NRHP, the District, in consultation with the Signatories and/or Consulting Parties, shall develop and implement plans for the appropriate treatment of historic properties.

D. All surveys will be conducted in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation* (48 FR 44720-23) and take into account the National Park Service publication *The Archaeological Survey: Methods and Uses* (1978) and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2017). The reconnaissance surveys and subsurface testing will be implemented and reported by the District. The District will then distribute the reports to IA SHPO and other parties, as appropriate, for review and comment.

E. In consultation with the IA SHPO, and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, the District shall evaluate for eligibility all properties by applying the NRHP criteria (36 CFR 60.4).

1. For those properties that the District and the IA SHPO (and in consultation with the THPOs/Tribes, as appropriate) agree are not eligible for nomination to or inclusion in the NRHP, no further investigations of those properties will be required, and the project may proceed in those areas.

2. If the survey results in the identification of properties that the District and the IA SHPO and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, agree are eligible for inclusion on the NRHP, such properties shall be treated in accordance with Section II, *Treatment of Historic Properties*.

II. TREATMENT OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

The District will ensure that the following guidelines are implemented when dealing with historic properties in the APE. In order of preference:

A. Avoidance. The preferred treatment for all archeological, historical, and architectural historic properties is avoidance of direct and indirect effects resulting from the Undertaking. All work shall, to the extent feasible, avoid historic properties either through project design changes, use of temporary fences or barricades during construction, realignments, landscaping, or other measures that the Signatories agree will adequately protect historic properties in both the short- and long-term.

B. Reduction of Effects on Properties Preserved in Place. When the District determines that complete avoidance of historic properties is not feasible, the District shall ensure that alternatives are explored to reduce the magnitude of the effects on the historic properties. Exploration of ways to reduce adverse effects will include the consideration of preservation of historic properties or the protection of historic

properties against impacts by project-related activities in close proximity to the property.

C. Treatment Plans. Proposed treatment plan should endeavor to minimize effects to historic resources to the greatest extent possible. Proposed plans will be provided to all Signatories for review and comment. Unless the IA SHPO (and, in consultation with the THPOs/Tribes, as appropriate) objects within 30 days of receipt of any plan, the District shall ensure that the treatment plans are implemented. The District shall revise treatment plans in response to comments and recommendations provided by the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and other Consulting Parties so long as the Signatories can agree in writing that they equitably mitigate project effects. Should Signatories not agree, the District will request the ACHP's comments in accordance with Stipulation VII of the PA, *Dispute Resolution*.

 D. Mitigation. When the District, in consultation with the IA SHPO and Consulting Parties as appropriate, determines that project activities will have an adverse effect on a historic property(ies), and that avoidance or in-place preservation is not feasible, the District, in consultation with the Signatories, shall ensure that a mitigation plan is developed for these properties in accordance with Appendix E, *Programmatic Mitigation of Effects.* The District will forward such plans onto the IA SHPO and Consulting Parties as appropriate, for their review and comment.

PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

E. Buildings and Structures. When avoidance or in-place preservation is not feasible, treatment plans for NRHP listed or eligible objects, structures or buildings shall adhere to the following guidelines:

1. Documentation. The District will engage a qualified architectural historian to conduct intensive-level survey and prepare Historic American Buildings Survey (HABS)/Historic American Engineering Record (HAER) -standard documentation of the building, structure, or object in accordance with this PA with the understanding that documentation may not represent the only mitigation measure employed in resolving the adverse effect. HABS/HAER-standard documentation means products acceptable for inclusion in the HABS/HAER/Historic American Landscapes Survey collection at the Library of Congress in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Architectural and Engineering Documentation.

2. Relocation. The District shall ascertain, in consultation with the Signatories and other Consulting Parties, whether it is feasible and prudent to move the historic building or structure to a new location where it can be preserved. Adverse effects upon an object, structure or building contributing to a Historic District will include consideration of effects to the object, structure or building, as well as to the entire Historic District.

3. Property Transfer/Marketing. Any sale and removal/demolition of an historic

object, structure or building that is leveraged by the Undertaking becomes part of the Undertaking and is subject to the terms of this agreement.

4. Demolition. If, following consultation, the Signatories agree that relocation is not feasible, or if there are no offers for the historic property and no other prudent and feasible creative alternatives present themselves, the District, in consultation with the signatories shall engage a qualified architectural historian to conduct intensive-level survey and prepare HABS/HAER-standard documentation of the historic property.

 F. Archeological Data Recovery. The District shall ensure that any NRHP-eligible or -listed archaeological site whose preservation in-place is not feasible is subject to data recovery, following a data recovery plan developed in consultation with the IA SHPO, and THPOs/Tribes as appropriate, and subject to a 30-day review and comment period. All data recovery plans shall be consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Archaeological Documentation* (48 FR 44734-37), the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2017) and take into account the ACHP's publication: *Treatment of Archaeological Properties*. Each data recovery plan shall specify, at a minimum:

1. the property, properties, or portions of properties where data recovery is to be carried out;

2. the research questions to be addressed through the data recovery, with an explanation of their relevance and importance;

3. the methods to be used, with an explanation of their relevance to the research questions;

4. the methods to be used in analysis, data management, and dissemination of data, including a schedule;

5. the proposed disposition of recovered materials and records;

6. proposed methods for involving the interested public in the data recovery; and

7. a proposed schedule for the submission of progress reports to the IA SHPO, and, where applicable, Consulting Parties.

G. Historic Properties of Traditional Religious and Cultural Significance

1. If a property of traditional religious and cultural significance to Tribes and/or any other groups, or societies is identified within the APE, the District shall develop a treatment plan for that property in consultation with the Signatories and the Consulting Parties that could be affected by proposed activities at the specific historic site or property involved. The plan will cover analysis of treatment options (including consideration of a no build alterative) and selection of a recommended treatment for

the property and the measures which will be undertaken by the District to ensure that the plan is implemented.

2. if responses are not received within 30 days of receipt of the plan by the IA SHPO and affected Consulting Parties. the District shall submit the plan to the IA SHPO and to the affected Consulting Parties and shall implement the plan in accordance with the procedures outlined in therein,

3. Should a formal objection to the final plan be submitted within 30 days following its distribution, the District, the IA SHPO, and the affected Consulting Parties shall attempt to resolve the objection. If the objection is not resolved within 90 days, the District shall request the comments of the ACHP or Keeper in accordance with Stipulation VII, *Dispute Resolution*.

 H. Construction. Construction proposed for the Undertaking on or adjacent to significant historic properties (including those properties deemed eligible to be, or listed on the NRHP), the District shall ensure that the design and specifications for new construction are developed in consultation with Signatories and Consulting Parties; the District will forward the plans to the IA SHPO for their review and comment. The District shall ensure that the project design for new construction is technically feasible and economically prudent; is compatible with the historic and architectural qualities of the historic property or district in question in terms of style. scale, massing, color, and materials; and is responsive to the recommended approaches to new construction set forth in the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation (National Park Service 1983). The District acknowledges that project measures have not been finalized and may change or be modified since economical, operational, engineering, and environmental studies are ongoing. The District will therefore determine effects as directed under Section 106 of the NHPA, as amended and its implementing regulations 36 Part 800: "Protection of Historic Properties." Also, the District will:

1. consider the Undertaking's direct and indirect effects, such as all construction areas, including the construction zones footprints for dredging, dredge material placement, planting, riprap placement, and any other project-related features and ancillary features proposed.

2. consider and coordinate with the IA SHPO, areas with the potential for containing submerged historic properties.

APPENDIX E

PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

PROCEDURES

A. Here, and throughout Appendix E, actions taken pursuant to the agreement will occur in consultation with the Signatories. The District shall provide the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties with letter reports summarizing the alternatives considered to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to affected properties in the event adverse effects to such properties cannot be avoided. The IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties may request that the District consider other alternatives to avoid, minimize or mitigate adverse effects.

B. After the Signatories agree on a proposed alternative to mitigate adverse effects, the Signatories will develop a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to memorialize the mutually agreed upon strategy. Once these parties have finalized the MOA and as appropriate, received comment from the Consulting Parties, a copy will be filed with the ACHP. The District shall ensure that all provisions set forth in each MOA will be carried out. Unanticipated Discoveries are addressed in Appendix C.

C. Standard mitigation measures to be considered include, but are not limited to, the following:

1. Documentation

a. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will ensure that the appropriate level of documentation is performed prior to the substantial alteration, relocation, or demolition of any historic building or structure. Documentation shall be consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Architectural and Engineering Documentation* and the *Standards for Historical Documentation* and at a minimum will include: photographs of external façades and internal and external character-defining features, and the completion of new or updated lowa Site Inventory forms.

b. Unless otherwise agreed to by the IA SHPO in a Memorandum of Agreement, the District shall ensure that all documentation is completed and the District shall ensure this documentation is submitted to the IA SHPO and recommended for acceptance prior to the demolition, alteration, or relocation of the historic building or structure.

c. The District will provide copies of the documentation to the IA SHPO, appropriate THPOs/Tribes, and other local, county, or state organizations which the IA SHPO recommends.

2. Mitigation for Archeological Sites Eligible Other than or in Addition to Criterion D. If preservation in place is not feasible, the District shall consult with the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes as appropriate, to develop a mitigation plan for any

archeological site that is eligible to the NRHP under criteria other than, or in addition to, Criterion D of 36 C.F.R. Part 60. The District shall submit the plan to the IA SHPO and THPOs/Tribes as appropriate for review and comment.

3. Alteration and Flood Risk Management Measures Not Adhering to the Standards. The District shall consult with the Signatories and Consulting Parties to develop alternate treatment or mitigation plans for those features which cannot meet the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Rehabilitation*. The District shall submit these plans to the IA SHPO for review and comment.

4. Other Mitigation Strategies. The District, IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties shall consult to devise other mitigation strategies in instances where those included in this agreement do not satisfactorily mitigate adverse effects to historic properties. It may be necessary to develop separate MOAs for effects on specific historic properties.

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1 PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT AMONG THE UNITED STATES ARMY CORPS OF 2 ENGINEERS, ROCK ISLAND DISTRICT, AND THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC 3 PRESERVATION OFFICE REGARDING THE GREEN ISLAND HABITAT 4 REHABILITATION AND ENHANCEMENT PROJECT, JACKSON COUNTY, IOWA 5
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WHEREAS, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Rock Island District (District) is 8 proposing a habitat rehabilitation and enhancement project (Project) in Pool 13 of the 9 Upper Mississippi River, in Jackson County, Iowa (Appendix A). Areas considered as 10 part of this Project and described as the Project area include the Green Island Wildlife 11 Management Area; and,

WHEREAS, the District has determined the proposed Project constitutes an 14 Undertaking subject to the requirements of 36 CFR Part 800, the regulations 15 implementing Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA; 54 USC § 16 306108); and,

WHEREAS, the District has determined that the proposed Project is the type of 19 Undertaking that has the potential to affect historic properties listed in or eligible for 20 listing on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP), and therefore will consult 21 with the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), the Iowa State Historic 22 Preservation Officer (IA SHPO), Indian tribes, the Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist (IA OSA), and other 24 Interested and Consulting Parties (Appendix B) pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.14(b) of the 25 regulations implementing Section 106 of the NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 306108) and Section 26 110(f) of the same Act (54 U.S.C. § 306107); and,

WHEREAS, the identification and evaluation of historic properties and of 29 effect will not be completed prior to the completion of the environmental document 30 needed for compliance with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA), making 31 execution of this Programmatic Agreement (PA) for the Project appropriate pursuant to 32 36 CFR § 800.14(b)(1)(ii); and,

WHEREAS, in recognition of the unique government-to-government relationship 35 between the Federal government and the Indian tribes, the District will notify the tribes 36 (Appendix B) of the Undertaking, and of the potential for effects that the Undertaking 37 may have upon historic properties which may be of particular interest to them, and has 38 invited the tribes to participate as concurring parties to this agreement, with no tribes 39 responding in the affirmative; and,

WHEREAS, the USFWS, has declined to participate as a Signatory to this PA due to 42 the fact that the Undertaking will occur only on Federal fee title lands under the District's 43 jurisdiction; and,

WHEREAS, the District has not fully determined the scope of activity and Area of 47 Potential Effect (APE) for the Undertaking (Appendix A) but will consult with the 48 Signatories and Consulting Parties in a timely manner prior to implementation in order 49 to determine the APE for all of the actions subject to the terms of this agreement, and 50 shall propose and document modifications to the APE throughout the duration of this PA 51 in accordance with the stipulations of this PA; and,

WHEREAS, the District shall seek and consider the views of the public and shall 54 provide information to the public about the Undertaking and its effects on historic 55 properties following agency procedures pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.2(d); and in a 56 manner that observes confidentiality requirements pursuant to Section 304 of the Act 57 and applicable state laws: and.

WHEREAS, the parties to this agreement have agreed to certain programmatic 73 mitigation measures (Appendix E) but in so doing also recognize that not all effects can 74 be mitigated programmatically and therefore have agreed to re-enter consultation in 75 order to devise appropriate remedial measures when the need arises; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1), the District has notified the 78 ACHP and IA SHPO of this PA. The IA SHPO, having completed consultation in 79 accordance to procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800, and the ACHP having chosen not to participate in the 81 consultation pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1)(iii);

NOW, THEREFORE, the District, and the IA SHPO (hereinafter Signatories), agree that 84 the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations of 85 this PA to satisfy the District's Section 106 responsibilities for the Undertaking.

87 The District shall ensure that the following stipulations of this PA are carried out: 88

90 STIPULATIONS

92 I. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

93 A. The Signatories to this PA are the District and the IA SHPO. Collectively, the 94 Signatories, and Concurring Parties are referred to in this PA as "Parties". The 95 Signatories and the Concurring Parties have rights as defined under 36 CFR § 800.6.

B. The District is responsible for oversight of performance under this PA and shall 97 carry out compliance with Section 106 of the NHPA, including leading consultation as it 98 pertains to identification and evaluation of historic properties and findings of effect.

- **C.** The District's consultants shall provide to the District completed cultural 100 resource reports with fully documented eligibility recommendations and 101 other requirements as noted in the contractual work order statement.
- **D.** Unanticipated Discoveries (Appendix C), Historic Properties Identification and 103 Procedures for Project Review (Appendix D), Programmatic Mitigation of Effects 104 (Appendix E) are detailed in the appendices as listed.

105 II. THE DISTRICT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

- **A.** The District shall serve as the principal authority in matters concerning the 107 interpretation of this agreement, its appendices, and the routine execution of its 108 terms, all subject to the Dispute Resolution (see Stipulation VII). The District, at its 109 discretion, may consult directly with the IA SHPO and ACHP.
- **B.** The District shall ensure that the procedures for Project-specific consultation, 111 historic properties identification and evaluation, assessment of effects, mitigation of 112 adverse effects, and treatment of historic properties are implemented in accordance 113 with procedures outlined in Appendices D and E.
- **C.** The District shall ensure that all historic properties investigations, 115 evaluations, treatment plans, and data recovery efforts devised and conducted 116 pursuant to this agreement shall be performed by or under the direct supervision of 117 an individual that meets the Secretary of the Interior's Qualifications Standards (36 118 CFR Part 61); and, shall be performed in a manner that is consistent with Secretary 119 of the Interior's Standards and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for* 120 *Archaeological Investigations in Iowa*, and all other Federal or State standards as 121 appropriate.
- **D.** The District shall ensure that documentation submitted to IA SHPO for review 123 meets the standards outlined at 36 CFR 800.11. Pursuant to Section 304 of the 124 NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 307103), the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA; 5 U.S.C. § 552), 125 the District shall withhold from disclosure to the public information relating to the 126 location or character of historic resources when, in consultation with the lowa State 127 Archaeologist, it has been determined that disclosure of such information may create 128 a substantial risk of harm, theft, or destruction to such resources or to the area or

 129 place where such resources are located, to the extent such withholding is authorized
 130 under the FOIA and other Federal laws applicable to the District, or unless directed
 131 to release such information by Court Order.
- **E.** The District shall ensure that all archeological reports resulting from actions 133 pursuant to this agreement shall be consistent with the most recent version of the 134 *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa*, and to the Department of the 135 Interior's Format Standards for Final Reports of Data Recovery Programs (42 FR 136 5377-79). Precise location data should be provided only in a separate appendix if it 137 appears that release of such data could jeopardize archeological deposits.
- **F.** The District shall invite the participation of consulting parties (Apendix B) in all activities 139 authorized under this agreement. (Note: The District must invite

140 tribal consultation for all activities, even those excluded by regulation or agreement from 141 IA SHPO review, unless a previous arrangement with individual or united tribes has 142 been made). Parties that have a consultative role in the Section 106 process include, 143 but are not limited to, the following: federally-recognized Indian tribes; representatives of 144 local governments; county and municipal historic preservation commissions including 145 those established under the Certified Local Governments program; the public; the 146 National Trust for Historic Preservation; the Preservation Iowa organization; and 147 individuals and organizations who, due to the nature of their legal or economic relation 148 to the Undertaking or their concern with the Undertaking's effects on historic properties, 149 demonstrate a legitimate interest.

150 **G.** The District shall ensure that artifacts, samples, and associated materials 151 (ecofacts) recovered during from federally-owned lands shall be 152 curated, along with all associated records, at the District's regional curation facility in the 153 Illinois State Museum that meets standards established in 36 CFR 79. The Corps shall ensure 154 reasonable availability of curated records and material to future professional and academic research.

155 III. THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

156 The IA SHPO shall comment on all activities designated for its review in a timely and 157 efficient manner and in accordance with procedures outlined in Appendices C, D, and E.

158 IV. UNANTICIPATED DISCOVERIES

159 The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix C are observed in the 160 event that human remains, non-mortuary archeological material, and architectural 161 properties are encountered during construction or archaeological investigations.

162 V. HISTORIC PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION, EVALUATION AND PROJECT REVIEW

163 The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix D are observed for all 164 cultural resource investigations, historic properties identification, and project review.

166 VI. PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

167 The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix E are observed in the 168 event that the Project will have an adverse effect on historic properties.

169 VII. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

170 **A.** Should any signatory or concurring party to this PA object at any time to any 171 actions proposed or the manner in which the terms of this agreement are implemented, 172 the District shall consult with such party to resolve the objection. If the District 173 determines that such objection cannot be resolved:

174 **1.** The District will forward all documentation relevant to the dispute, including 175 the District's proposed resolution, to the ACHP. The ACHP shall provide the District with 176 its advice on the resolution of the objection within 30 days of receiving adequate 177 documentation. Prior to reaching a final decision on the dispute, the District shall

178 prepare a written response that takes into account any timely advice or comments 179 regarding the dispute from the ACHP, signatories and concurring parties, and provide 180 them with a copy of this written response. The District will then proceed according to its 181 final decision.

182 **2.** If the ACHP does not provide its advice regarding the dispute within the 30-183 day time period, the District may make a final decision on the dispute and proceed 184 accordingly. Prior to reaching such a final decision, the District shall prepare a written 185 response that takes into account any timely comments regarding the dispute from the 186 signatories and concurring parties to the Agreement and provide them and the ACHP 187 with a copy of such written response.

188 **3.** The District's responsibility to carry out all other actions subject to the 189 terms of this PA that are not subject of the dispute remain unchanged.

190 **B.** If the District and the IA SHPO and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, do 191 not agree on NRHP eligibility, or if the Signatories, ACHP, or the National Park 192 Service so request, the District will request a formal determination of eligibility from 193 the Keeper of the NRHP, National Park Service, whose determination shall be final.

194 VIII. DURATION

195 This agreement will become void if its terms are not carried out within five years from 196 the date of its execution. Six months prior to the fifth anniversary of the agreement 197 execution date, the District shall consult with the other signatories to reconsider the 198 terms of the agreement and amend it in accordance with Stipulation X, *Amendments*. 199 The terms of this Agreement shall remain in-force for a period of five years commencing 200 at the date of its execution. At the end of this period the District shall review the 201 necessity of this Agreement in order to determine whether it should be reissued or 202 allowed to expire. If the Agreement requires reissue, the District shall consult with the IA 203 SHPO in order to ensure compliance with the most current version of the Federal 204 regulations (36 CFR Part 800) implementing Sections 106 and 110(f) of the NHPA (54 205 U.S.C. § 306108 and 306107). Extension of this agreement duration requires written 206 amendment executed by all Signatories and filed with the ACHP.

207 IX. TERMINATION

208 Any of the Signatories to this PA may request a reconsideration of its terms or revoke 209 the agreement upon written notification to the other Signatories by providing 30 days' 210 notice to the other Signatories, provided that the Signatories will consult in good faith during the 211 period prior to termination to seek agreement on amendments or other actions that 212 would avoid termination. In the advent of termination, the District will comply with 36 213 CFR 800.3 through 800.7 with regard to individual actions covered by this PA.

214 X. AMENDMENTS

215 Any of the Signatories to this PA may request that any or all of its articles be amended 216 subsequent to the PA's execution, whereupon the other Signatories will consult in 217 accordance with 36 CFR 800.13, to consider such amendment. The District must notify 218 the ACHP of its intent to amend the Agreement and invite the ACHP's review and 219 comment. The amendment will be effective on the date a copy signed by all of the 220 Signatories is filed with the ACHP. The District shall ensure that copies of the amended 221 Agreement are provided to all of the signatories. The District shall follow the above

222 procedures for amendment in the event that the Undertaking is redefined by the 223 selection of a different alternative or through the adoption of multiple alternatives. 224 Revisions to the appendices shall not require notification of and review by the ACHP. 225 The appendices to the PA can be changed by written concurrence by the District and 226 the IA SHPO. However, the District shall ensure that the ACHP and consulting parties 227 are provided file copies of finalized versions that reflect all revisions.

228 XI. ANTI-DEFICIENCY ACT

229 The parties to this agreement acknowledge the District's fiduciary responsibilities 230 pursuant to the Anti-Deficiency Act (31 USC § 1341). This notwithstanding, the District's 231 responsibilities to fulfill the terms of this agreement and to comply with the requirements 232 of the NHPA remain unchanged regardless of the availability or level of funding 233 appropriated for its purposes.

234 XII. EXECUTION OF THE AGREEMENT

235 This agreement will become effective upon the District's receipt of signatures on this 236 agreement by all Signatories. Execution of this agreement by the District and the IA 237 SHPO and the implementation of its terms evidence that the District has taken into 238 account program effects on historic properties and has afforded the ACHP an 239 opportunity to comment.

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

448 UNANTICIPATED DISCOVERY

449 Here, and throughout Appendix C, actions taken pursuant to this agreement will 450 occur in consultation with the Signatories and Consulting Parties.

451 A. Human Remains. Iowa law protects all human remains regardless of their 452 historical age, sex, or cultural/ethnic affiliation.

453 1. In the event that human remains are encountered during archeological 454 investigations or construction activities, work shall cease within 100 feet of the 455 remains, appropriate steps shall be taken to secure the site, and officials at the 456 District, the Bioarchaeology Program at the Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist (IA 457 OSA), and the IA SHPO shall be notified and, to the best of their ability, shall respond 458 within three (3) working days to such notification in order to determine the next 459 course of action that ensures the applicable Iowa law is followed. At the District, this 460 official shall be an Archeologist in the Environmental Compliance or Planning 461 branches, or their designee. At the IA OSA, this official shall be the Bioarchaeology 462 Program Director or their designee. At the IA SHPO, this official shall be a Review 463 Archaeologist.

464 2. If the remains appear to be ancient (i.e., older than 150 years), and are 465 determined to be ethnically Native American, the District shall be responsible for 466 adhering to the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act [NAGPRA 467 (P.L. 101-601; 25 U.S.C. 3001-3013;104 Stat. 3048-3058)]. The IA OSA shall have 468 jurisdiction to ensure that the appropriate procedures in accordance with applicable 469 lowa law (Code of Iowa, Sections 263B, 523I.316.6 and 716.5; IAC 685, Ch.11.1) are 470 observed, but are not financially responsible for costs incurred during this process. 471 The disposition of the remains will be arranged in accordance with NAGPRA and 472 Chapter 263B of the Iowa Code.

473 3. Human remains less than 150 years old that are determined to be ethnically 474 Native American are protected under the Native American Graves Protection and 475 Repatriation Act (P.L. 101-601; 25 USC 3001-3013) and Chapter 523I of the Iowa 476 Code. The District shall be responsible for adhering to these laws. In the event that 477 human remains appearing less than 150 years in age are encountered, the District 478 shall ensure that appropriate law enforcement authorities and the Iowa Department of 479 Health are notified. The IA OSA shall ensure that appropriate procedures in 480 accordance with applicable Iowa law are observed but are not financially responsible 481 for costs incurred during this process.

482 4. Before work can resume within 100 feet of the human remains, the District 483 must determine the NRHP eligibility of the archeological resource in consultation with 484 the IA SHPO and tribal representatives, as applicable.

485 5. Upon a determination of eligibility, and decision to preserve in place by the IA 486 OSA, or designee, the District shall submit a plan for avoidance and protection to the 487 District for review and comment. The District will provide the proposed plan to all 488 Consulting Parties. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven (7) working 489 days to provide comments to the Corps on the proposed plan for final approval.

- 490 6. Upon a determination of eligibility, and decision to remove the human remains 491 by the IA OSA, or their designee, the District shall submit a plan for relocation and 492 recovery of information to the District for review and comment. The District will 493 provide the proposed plan to all Consulting Parties. The IA SHPO and Consulting 494 Parties will have seven (7) working days to provide comments to the Corps on the 495 proposed plan for further consideration.
- 496 7. Work within 100 feet of the human remains shall resume upon the 497 development and approval of an appropriate relocation and data recovery 498 plan, other recommended mitigation procedures, or agreement among the District, IA 499 OSA and IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation.
- 500 B. Archaeological Material (non-mortuary related). The District shall ensure that 501 the following procedures are observed in the event that previously undetected non 502 mortuary-related archeological materials are encountered.
- 503 1. All activities within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall cease 504 immediately, appropriate steps shall be implemented to secure the site, and the 505 District and IA SHPO shall be notified of the discovery and shall respond within five 506 working days to such notification. Construction work may continue in the area outside 507 the 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery provided that archaeological investigations have demonstrated the absence of features/ deposits in those areas.
- 508 2. An archeologist retained by the District will inspect the work site and 509 determine the extent of the affected archeological resource within five working days 510 of its discovery.
- 511 3. Before work can resume within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery, the 512 District must determine the NRHP eligibility and boundaries of the archeological resource in 513 consultation with the IA SHPO and other Consulting Parties, as applicable.
- 514 4. Upon an evaluation of eligibility, the District or their designee shall submit a 515 plan for avoidance, protection, recovery of information, or destruction without data 516 recovery to the District for review and comment within 20 working days. The District 517 will notify all Consulting Parties of the unanticipated discovery and provide the 518 proposed treatment plan for their consideration. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties 519 will have seven working days to provide comments on the proposed treatment plan 520 upon receipt of the information.
- 521 5. Work within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall resume upon either:
- 522 a. The development, approval, and implementation of an appropriate data recovery 523 plan, other recommended mitigation procedures, or agreement among the District 524 and the IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation; or,
- 525 b. Agreement by the IA SHPO and the District that the newly located 526 archeological is not eligible for inclusion on the NRHP.
- 527 c. If the District and IA SHPO object to any part of the treatment plan and 528 they are not able to reach resolution of the objection within seven working days of

529 when the objection is raised, the District shall follow the procedures outlined in 530 Stipulation VII of the PA, *Dispute Resolution*.

531 C. Adverse Effects upon Architectural Properties. The District shall ensure that 532 the following procedures are observed in the event that post-review effects to historic 533 buildings, structures, objects, or districts are identified.

534 1. Work within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall cease and the 535 District shall notify the IA SHPO of the discovery and the IA SHPO will respond within 536 five working days to such notification. Construction work may continue in the area 537 outside the 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery provided previous survey has demonstrated that no other properties are present..

538 2. An architectural historian retained by the District will inspect the work site and 539 evaluate the National Register eligibility of the property within seven working days. 540 The District, in consultation with the District, shall assess the project effects. The 541 District shall provide its report of findings and determination of effect to the IA SHPO 542 who shall have seven working days to provide comments.

543 3. Upon assessment of adverse effect, the District shall submit a plan for after 544 the-fact mitigation to the District for review and comment. The District will notify all 545 Consulting Parties of the unanticipated discovery and provide the plan for their 546 consideration. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven working days to 547 provide comments on the plan upon its receipt. The District may implement the plan if 548 IA SHPO fails to respond within the allotted timeframe provided that no concerns have been raised by other consulting parties.

549 4. Work within 100 feet of the unanticipated discovery shall resume upon either:

550 a. Agreement by the District and the IA SHPO that the effects are not 551 adverse; or,

552 b. The development, approval, and implementation of an appropriate plan, or 553 agreement among the District and the IA SHPO that the site does not warrant 554 mitigation.

555 c. If the District and IA SHPO object to any part of the plan and they are not 556 able to reach resolution of the objection within seven working days of when the 557 objection is raised, the District shall follow the procedures outlined in Stipulation VII, 558 *Dispute Resolution*.

559 D. Failure to Act within Specified Timeframe. If any principal signatory fails to 560 meet the timeframes set in Appendix C, *Unanticipated Discoveries*, the District may 561 proceed to final decision-making provided that such is consistent with controlling State and Federal laws and regulations

566 HISTORIC PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION. EVALUATION

567 AND PROCEDURES FOR PROJECT REVIEW

568 I. HISTORIC PROPERTY SURVEYS AND TESTING

569

570 Here, and throughout Appendix D, actions taken pursuant to this agreement will

571 occur in consultation with the Consulting Parties. The District will make a reasonable and

572 good faith effort to identify historic properties that are within the Area of Potential

573 Effect (APE) and provide this information, and associated studies or reports to the

574 Consulting Parties as appropriate. This shall be accomplished through the implementation of background archival investigation; geomorphological testing, landform sediment assemblage (LSA) interpretation, and geoarchaeological assessment; historic

575 property surveys and testing and agreed upon treatments of historic properties. The 576 District, in consultation with the Signatories, will ensure that the following measures 577 are implemented:

578

579 A. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will provide scholarly evidence of 580 stewardship (typically documented in a technical report written by a qualified 581 archeologist or architectural historian) in the recordation, protection, and 582 management of historic properties within the APE through systemic research and 583 studies which have been finalized and approved, then placed in the permanent files 584 of the IA SHPO and IA OSA (as necessary) as evidence of compliance promulgated 585 under Section 106 of the NHPA, as amended and its implementing regulations 36 586 C.F.R. Part 800: "Protection of Historic Properties."

- 588 B. No archeological historic property survey will be required where the District has 589 documented and IA SHPO concurs that:
- 590 1. Profound ground surface disturbances have so completely altered the 591 the area under consideration as to make the existence of historic properties impossible (e.g., complete 592 stripping of all soils down to sterile subsoil); or,
- 593 2. Geomorphological investigations indicate deeply buried deposits deeper than 594 project impacts or very low potential for near surface cultural deposits; or,
- 595 3. An area previously has been surveyed at the appropriate level of investigation 596 necessary to cover the entire APE utilizing methods consistent with the Secretary of 597 the Interior's Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation (48 FR 598 44720-23) and taking into account the National Park Service publication The 599 Archaeological Survey: Methods and Uses (1978) and the most recent version of the 600 Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa (2022) and has been 601 recommended for acceptance by the IA SHPO. 602

603 C. The District will ensure that the necessary surveys are performed on all 604 areas within the APE indirectly and directly affected by the Undertaking. The District 605 will evaluate historic properties relative to past surveys and reports and properties 606 deemed ineligible with IA SHPO's concurrence based upon the evaluation of the

607 most recent survey; surveys occurring within the last five years that have been 608 recommended for acceptance by the IA SHPO and provide full vertical and horizontal 609 coverage of the APE will not be reevaluated. If a survey results in the identification of 610 properties that are eligible to the NRHP, the District, in consultation with the 611 Signatories and/or Consulting Parties, shall develop and implement plans for the 612 appropriate treatment of historic properties.

613

614 D. All surveys will be conducted in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the 615 Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation* (48 FR 44720-616 23) and take into account the National Park Service publication *The Archaeological* 617 *Survey: Methods and Uses* (1978) and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for* 618 *Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2022). The reconnaissance surveys and 619 subsurface testing will be implemented and reported by the District. The District will 620 then distribute the reports to IA SHPO and other parties, as appropriate, for review 621 and comment.

622

623 E. In consultation with the IA SHPO, and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, the 624 District shall evaluate the eligibility of all properties by applying the NRHP criteria (36 625 CFR 60.4).

626

627 1. For those properties that the District and the IA SHPO (and in consultation 628 with the THPOs/Tribes, as appropriate) agree are not eligible for nomination to or 629 inclusion in the NRHP, no further investigations of those properties will be required, 630 and the project may proceed in those areas.

631

632 2. If the survey results in the identification of properties that the District and the 633 IA SHPO and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, agree are eligible for inclusion on 634 the NRHP, such properties shall be treated in accordance with Section II, *Treatment 635 of Historic Properties, as appropriate*.

636

637 II. TREATMENT OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

638

639 The District will ensure that the following guidelines are implemented when dealing 640 with historic properties in the APE. The following does not prevent a consideration of alternatives or modification to listed preferred alternatives. In order of preference:

642 A. Avoidance. The preferred treatment for all archeological, historical, and
643 architectural historic properties is avoidance of direct and indirect effects resulting
644 from the Undertaking. All work shall, to the extent feasible, avoid historic properties
645 either through project design changes, use of spatial buffers, temporary fences or barricades during
646 construction, realignments, landscaping, or other measures that the Signatories
647 agree will adequately protect historic properties in both the short- and long-term.

649 B. Reduction of Effects on Properties Preserved in Place. When the District
650 determines that complete avoidance of historic properties is not feasible, the District
651 shall ensure that alternatives are explored to reduce the magnitude of the effects on
652 the historic properties. Exploration of ways to reduce adverse effects will include the
653 consideration of preservation of historic properties or the protection of historic
654 properties against impacts by project-related activities or long-term effects resulting therefrom in close
proximity to the

655 property.

657 C. Treatment Plans. Proposed treatment plan should endeavor to minimize effects 658 to historic resources to the greatest extent possible. Proposed plans will be provided 659 to all Signatories for review and comment. Unless the IA SHPO (and, in consultation 660 with the THPOs/Tribes, as appropriate) objects within 30 days of receipt of any plan, 661 the District shall ensure that the treatment plans are implemented. The District shall 662 revise treatment plans in response to comments and recommendations provided by 663 the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and other Consulting Parties so long as the Signatories 664 can agree in writing that they equitably mitigate project effects. Should Signatories 665 not agree, the District will request the ACHP's comments in accordance with 666 Stipulation VII of the PA, *Dispute Resolution*.

668 D. Mitigation. When the District, in consultation with the IA SHPO and Consulting 669 Parties as appropriate, determines that project activities will have an adverse effect 670 on a historic property(ies), and that avoidance or in-place preservation is not feasible, 671 the District, in consultation with the Signatories, shall ensure that a mitigation plan is 672 developed for these properties in accordance with Appendix E, *Programmatic* 673 *Mitigation of Effects*. The District will forward such plans to the IA SHPO and 674 Consulting Parties as appropriate, for their review and comment.

676 PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

677 The following does not prevent a consideration of alternatives or modification to listed preferred alternatives.

678 E. Buildings and Structures. When avoidance or in-place preservation is not 679 feasible, treatment plans for NRHP listed or eligible objects, structures or buildings 680 shall adhere to the following guidelines:

682 1. Documentation. The District will engage a qualified architectural historian to 683 conduct intensive-level survey and prepare Historic American Buildings Survey 684 (HABS)/Historic American Engineering Record (HAER) -standard documentation of 685 the building, structure, or object in accordance with this PA with the understanding 686 that documentation may not represent the only mitigation measure employed in 687 resolving the adverse effect. HABS/HAER-standard documentation means products 688 acceptable for inclusion in the HABS/HAER/Historic American Landscapes Survey 689 collection at the Library of Congress in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's

689 collection at the Library of Congress in accordance with the Secretary of the Inter 690 Standards and Guidelines for Architectural and Engineering Documentation.

- 692 2. Relocation. The District shall ascertain, in consultation with the Signatories 693 and other Consulting Parties, whether it is feasible and prudent to move the historic 694 building or structure to a new location where it can be preserved. Adverse effects 695 upon an object, structure or building contributing to a Historic District will include 696 consideration of effects to the object, structure or building, as well as to the entire 697 Historic District.
- 699 3. Property Transfer/Marketing. Any sale and removal/demolition of an historic 700 object, structure or building that is leveraged by the Undertaking becomes part of the 701 Undertaking and is subject to the terms of this agreement.
- 703 4. Demolition. If, following consultation, the Signatories agree that relocation is 704 not feasible, or if there are no offers for the historic property and no other prudent and 705 feasible adaptive reuse alternatives present themselves, the District, in consultation with the

706 signatories shall engage a qualified architectural historian to conduct intensive-level 707 survey and prepare HABS/HAER-standard documentation of the historic property as one component to mitigation. Other negotiated measures may be adopted as appropriate..

709 F. Archeological Data Recovery. The District shall ensure that any NRHP-eligible 710 or -listed archaeological site whose preservation in-place is not feasible is subject to 711 data recovery, following a data recovery plan developed in consultation with the IA 712 SHPO, and THPOs/Tribes as appropriate, and subject to a 30-day review and 713 comment period. All data recovery plans shall be consistent with the Secretary of the 714 Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Archeological Documentation* (48 FR 44734-715 37), the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2022) and take into 716 account the ACHP's publication: *Treatment of Archeological Properties*. Each data 717 recovery plan shall specify, at a minimum:

718

719 1. the property, properties, or portions of properties where data recovery is to be 720 carried out;

721

722 2. the research questions to be addressed through the data recovery, with an 723 explanation of their relevance and importance;

724

725 3. the methods to be used, with an explanation of their relevance to the research 726 questions;

727

728 4. the methods to be used in analysis, data management, and dissemination of 729 data, including a schedule;

730

731 5. the proposed disposition of recovered materials and records;

/32

- 733 6. proposed methods for involving the interested public in the data recovery; and 734
- 735 7. a proposed schedule for the submission of progress reports to the IA SHPO, 736 and, where applicable, Consulting Parties.

737

- 738 G. Historic Properties of Traditional Religious and Cultural Significance
- 740 1. If a property of traditional religious and cultural significance to Tribes and/or 741 any other groups, or societies is identified within the APE, the District shall develop a 742 treatment plan for that property in consultation with the Signatories and the 743 Consulting Parties that could be affected by proposed activities at the specific historic 744 site or property involved. The plan will cover analysis of treatment options (including 745 consideration of a no build alterative) and selection of a recommended treatment for 746 the property and the measures which will be undertaken by the District to ensure that 747 the plan is implemented.

748

749 2. if responses are not received within 30 days of receipt of the plan by the IA 750 SHPO and affected Consulting Parties, the District shall submit the plan to the IA 751 SHPO and to the affected Consulting Parties and shall implement the plan in 752 accordance with the procedures outlined therein,

753

754 3. Should a formal objection to the final plan be submitted within 30 days 755 following its distribution, the District, the IA SHPO, and the affected Consulting

756 Parties shall attempt to resolve the objection. If the objection is not resolved within 90 757 days, the District shall request the comments of the ACHP or Keeper in accordance 758 with Stipulation VII, *Dispute Resolution*.

760 H. Construction. Construction proposed for the Undertaking on or adjacent to 761 significant historic properties (including those properties deemed eligible to be, or 762 listed on the NRHP), the District shall ensure that the design and specifications for 763 new construction are developed in consultation with Signatories and Consulting 764 Parties; the District will forward the plans to the IA SHPO for their review and 765 comment. The District shall ensure that the project design for new construction is 766 technically feasible and economically prudent; is compatible with the historic and 767 architectural qualities of the historic property or district in question in terms of style, 768 scale, massing, color, and materials; and is responsive to the recommended 769 approaches to new construction set forth in the Secretary of the Interior's Standards 770 for Rehabilitation (National Park Service 1983). The District acknowledges that 771 project measures have not been finalized and may change or be modified since 772 economical, operational, engineering, and environmental studies are ongoing. The 773 District will therefore determine effects as directed under Section 106 of the NHPA, 774 as amended and its implementing regulations 36 Part 800: "Protection of Historic 775 Properties." Also, the District will: 776

777 1. consider the Undertaking's direct and indirect effects, occurring in all 778 construction areas, including the construction zones footprints for dredging, dredge 779 material placement, planting, riprap placement, and any other project-related features 780 and ancillary features proposed.

781

782 2. consider and coordinate with the IA SHPO, review of areas with the potential for 783 containing deeply buried and submerged historic properties.
784

785

786 APPENDIX E 787 788 PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS 789 790 PROCEDURES

792 A. Here, and throughout Appendix E, actions taken pursuant to the agreement will 793 occur in consultation with the Signatories. The District shall provide the IA SHPO, 794 THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties with letter reports summarizing the 795 alternatives considered to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to affected 796 properties in the event adverse effects to such properties cannot be avoided. The IA 797 SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties may request that the District consider 798 other alternatives to avoid, minimize or mitigate adverse effects.

800 B. After the Signatories agree on a proposed alternative to mitigate adverse effects, 801 the Signatories will develop a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to memorialize the 802 mutually agreed upon strategy. Once these parties have finalized the MOA and as 803 appropriate, received comment from the Consulting Parties, an executed copy will be filed with 804 the ACHP. The District shall ensure that all provisions set forth in each MOA will be 805 carried out. Unanticipated Discoveries are addressed in Appendix C.

807 C. Standard mitigation measures to be considered include, but are not limited to, the 808 following:

809

791

810 1. Documentation

811 a. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will ensure that the 812 appropriate level of documentation is performed prior to the substantial alteration, 813 relocation, or demolition of any historic building or structure. Documentation shall be 814 consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Architectural and* 815 *Engineering Documentation* and the *Standards for Historical Documentation* and at a 816 minimum will include: photographs of external façades and internal and external 817 character-defining features, and the completion of new or updated lowa Site 818 Inventory forms.

819 b. Unless otherwise agreed to by the IA SHPO in a Memorandum of 820 Agreement, the District shall ensure that all documentation is completed and the 821 District shall ensure this documentation is submitted to the IA SHPO and 822 recommended for acceptance prior to the demolition, alteration, or relocation of the 823 historic building or structure.

824 c. The District will provide copies of the documentation to the IA SHPO, 825 appropriate THPOs/Tribes, and other local, county, or state organizations which the 826 IA SHPO recommends.

827

828 2. Mitigation for Archeological Sites Eligible Other than or in Addition to 829 Criterion D. If preservation in place is not feasible, the District shall consult with the 830 IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes as appropriate, to develop a mitigation plan for any 831 archeological site that is eligible to the NRHP under criteria other than, or in addition 832 to, Criterion D of 36 C.F.R. Part 60. The District shall submit the plan to the IA SHPO 833 and THPOs/Tribes as appropriate for review and comment.

835 3. Alteration and Flood Risk Management Measures Not Adhering to the 836 Standards. The District shall consult with the Signatories and Consulting Parties to 837 develop alternate treatment or mitigation plans for those features which cannot meet

838 the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Rehabilitation*. The District shall submit 839 these plans to the IA SHPO for review and comment. 840

841 4. Other Mitigation Strategies. The District, IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and 842 Consulting Parties shall consult to devise other mitigation strategies in instances 843 where those included in this agreement do not satisfactorily mitigate adverse effects 844 to historic properties. It may be necessary to develop separate MOAs for effects on 845 specific historic properties.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Rock Island District (District), has prepared the enclosed draft Programmatic Agreement (PA) between the District and the Iowa State Historic Preservation Office (IA SHPO) to address potential adverse effects to historic properties eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places within the Green Island Habitat Rehabilitation and Enhancement Project (HREP) project area in Jackson County, Iowa on the Mississippi River (Pool 13), as authorized under the Upper Mississippi River Restoration (UMRR) Program. Comments and suggestions received from your office in response to the May 31, 2022 draft of this PA have been incorporated into the enclosed version. The updated PA includes a stipulation specifying its duration for ten (10) years. As previously discussed with representatives of your office at in-person meetings held in Bellevue, Iowa on February 15, 2023, this PA is proposed to be the final project-level PA executed for a UMRR project located in the State of Iowa. The multi-District program-level PA currently under development to address potential effects to projects authorized under the Corps' Navigation and Ecosystem Sustainability Program (NESP)/UMRR will not invalidate the attached PA in the event that both are executed. Historic Properties Identification

Approximately 196 acres of the total 2,480 acres within the APE have been previously surveyed for cultural resources. Due to a large portion of the area not having been previously surveyed, the mapped Landform Sediment Assemblages (LSA) was reviewed to better understand archeological potential (Bettis et.al., 1996). Mapped LSAs within the study area consist of Early-Middle Holocene channel belt (post-ca. 7000 B.P.), Yazoo Meander Belt, alluvial fans and colluvial slopes, and tributary fan. Less than half of the Project's total area is underwater or seasonally inundated according to modern aerial imagery, however the earliest cadastral survey plat of the area archived by the Bureau of Land Management's General Land Office Records, dated 1839, shows most of the study area as dry land.

Seven prior archeological surveys overlap with small areas along the northern and southwestern boundaries of the study area (R&C# 19861249062, 19871049051, 19880300086, 19930500061, 19941049012, 20000849096, and 20080200004), including a survey reported in Benn et.al. (1989). These

surveys resulted in the identification of two archeological sites and two isolated finds. The sites identified include a prehistoric lithic scatter of unknown integrity and condition (identified 1987, revisited 1989); and a multi-component site (13JK150) documented through excavation to include a Middle Woodland prehistoric scatter of unknown integrity and condition, an Archaic/Early Woodland/Late Woodland (Lane Farm Phase) open habitation site, and an historic farm/residence on recently tilled cropland, all of unknown integrity (identified 1989, revisited in 2007 with recommendation to avoid). The two prehistoric isolated finds identified consist of one heat-treated lithic flake each (13JK251 and 13JK252) and are near the multi-component site discussed above, which is in an abandoned river meander. The multi-component site was the subject of a Phase II survey (Benn, 2007), and was determined to be potentially eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places. A buffered area encompassing the potentially eligible site 13JK150 and the whole of the peninsula extending eastward into Fish Lake has been incorporated into the project as a No Work Area (see Appendix A, Figure 3). Additionally, the Historic-Era Indian Locations Database (HILD) of the Office of the State Archaeologist (OSA) I-Sites GIS viewer indicates HILD 1184 and HILD 1185 as overlapping the Project APE. These sites are identified as an area indicated by settlers to be a campsite for historic Native American groups and the 1840s "Billy Mangler Lake Camp and Burials," respectively.

While known historic properties exist within the planned project area, the District has and will continue to appropriately consider these in planning, design, and construction of the Project, and any culturally sensitive areas will be protected by avoidance. For additional information related to the identification and evaluation of historic properties and procedures for project review, please refer to the Whereas clauses and Appendix B of the enclosed.

Action Requested

The District requests your office review the PA within 30 days of receipt of this letter and the Iowa Attorney General's Office as soon as feasible thereafter. All comments will be considered for inclusion within the final PA. To expedite review and consideration, please utilize the attached comment matrix (Enclosure 2) to record any concerns and recommendations you may have regarding the proposed stipulations of the PA. The completed comment matrix should be returned via email to the point of contact listed below. If you have no changes, please notify the District point of contact and we will initiate the execution process.



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PROGRAMMATIC AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE UNITED STATES ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS, ROCK ISLAND DISTRICT AND THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICE REGARDING THE GREEN ISLAND HABITAT REHABILITATION AND ENHANCEMENT PROJECT, JACKSON COUNTY, IOWA

WHEREAS, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) is authorized to carry out the Upper Mississippi River Restoration (UMRR) Program pursuant to Section 1103 of the WRDA of 1986 (P.L. 99-662), as amended, codified in 33 U.S.C. 652; and,

WHEREAS, the USACE Rock Island District (District) is proposing a habitat rehabilitation and enhancement project (Project) in Pool 13 of the Upper Mississippi River, in Jackson County, Iowa under the UMRR Program (Appendix A). Areas considered as part of this Project and described as the Project area include the Green Island Wildlife Management Area on Federal fee title lands; and,

WHEREAS, the USACE, as a Federal agency, is required to comply with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA), as amended (54 U.S.C. § 306108) and its implementing regulations, "Protection of Historic Properties," codified in 36 C.F.R. part 800; and,

WHEREAS, the District has determined the proposed Project constitutes an Undertaking subject to the requirements of 36 CFR Part 800, the regulations implementing Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act (NHPA; 54 USC §306108); and,

WHEREAS, the USACE has determined that the Project may have the potential to affect historic properties included in or eligible for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) as defined under 36 CFR § 800.16(y); and,

WHEREAS, the District has consulted with the State Historic Preservation Offices of Iowa (IA SHPO), the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation (ACHP), and the Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist (IA OSA), pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.14(b) of the regulations implementing Section 106 of the NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 306108) and Section 110(f) of the same Act (54 U.S.C. § 306107), on the development of this PA, and the SHPO is a Signatory to this PA; and

WHEREAS, known historic properties exist within the project area, the District shall appropriately consider in planning, design, and construction of the Project the potential effects of individual project features to these properties and additional historic properties identified under the procedures outline in Appendix B, and any culturally sensitive areas will be protected by avoidance; and,

WHEREAS, USACE projects under the Programs are subject to environmental review under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other environmental laws; and,

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WHEREAS, the USACE may defer final identification and evaluation of historic properties, assessment of effects, and resolution of adverse effects, if any, until after completing

requirements of the NEPA for undertakings under the Programs; and,

WHEREAS, the Undertaking may be designed and implemented by the USACE in phases, a phased process for Section 106 is hereby defined for this PA as the identification of the Area of Potential Effect (APE), identification and evaluation of historic properties, assessment of effects, and resolution of adverse effects that may begin prior to the USACE decision, but may not be fully completed until after the final USACE decision documentation is completed and before implementation of the affected Project feature begins; and,

WHEREAS, the USACE recognizes the Federal government's special relationship with Federally recognized Indian tribes and is responsible for government-to-government consultation pursuant to the NHPA, 36 CFR 800.2(c)(2)(ii), the American Indian Religious Freedom Act (42 U.S.C 1996), Executive Orders 13007 and 13175, and Sections 3(c) and 12 of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA, 25 U.S.C. 3001 et seq.); and

WHEREAS, the District will notify the tribes; the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, Forest County Potawatomi Community, Ho-Chunk Nation, Iowa Tribe of Kansas and Nebraska, Iowa Tribe of Oklahoma, Kaw Nation, Kickapoo Tribe in Kansas, Kickapoo Tribe of Oklahoma, Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, Meskwaki Nation, Miami Tribe of Oklahoma, Omaha Tribe of Nebraska, Otoe-Missouria Tribe, Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma, Ponca Tribe of Nebraska, Ponca Tribe of Oklahoma, Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation, Prairie Island Indian Community, Sac & Fox Nation of Missouri in Kansas & Nebraska, Sac and Fox Nation of Oklahoma, The Osage Nation, Upper Sioux Community, Minnesota, Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska; of the Undertaking, and of the potential for effects that the Undertaking may have upon historic properties which may be of particular interest to them, and has invited the tribes to participate as concurring parties to this agreement, with no tribes responding in the affirmative; and,

WHEREAS, the District has not fully determined the scope of activity within the Area of Potential Effect (APE) for the Undertaking (Appendix A) but will consult with the Signatories and Consulting Parties in a timely manner and prior to implementation, and shall propose and document modifications to the APE throughout the duration of this PA in accordance with the stipulations of this PA; and,

WHEREAS, the District shall seek and consider the views of the public and shall provide information to the public about the Undertaking and its effects on historic properties following agency procedures pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.2(d); and in a manner that observes confidentiality requirements pursuant to Section 304 of the Act and applicable state laws; and,

WHEREAS, the parties to this agreement have agreed to certain programmatic mitigation measures (Appendix C) but in so doing also recognize that not all effects can be mitigated programmatically and therefore have agreed to re-enter consultation in order to devise appropriate remedial measures when the need arises; and,

WHEREAS, in accordance with 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1), the District has notified the ACHP and IA SHPO of this PA. The IA SHPO, having completed consultation in accordance with procedures outlined in 36 CFR 800, and the ACHP having chosen not to participate in the consultation pursuant to 36 CFR § 800.6(a)(1)(iii);

NOW, THEREFORE, the District and the IA SHPO (hereinafter Signatories), agree that the Undertaking shall be implemented in accordance with the following stipulations of this PA to satisfy the District's Section 106 responsibilities for the Undertaking. The District shall ensure that the following stipulations of this PA are carried out:

STIPULATIONS

I. GENERAL RESPONSIBILITIES

 A. The Signatories to this PA are the District and the IA SHPO. Collectively, the Signatories, and Concurring Parties are referred to in this PA as "Parties". The Signatories and the Concurring Parties have rights as defined under 36 CFR § 800.6.

B. The District is responsible for oversight of performance under this PA and shall carry out compliance with Section 106 of the NHPA, including leading consultation as it pertains to identification and evaluation of historic properties and findings of effect, mitigation of adverse effects, and management of historic properties pursuant to Section 110.

C. The District's consultants shall provide to the District completed cultural resource reports with fully documented eligibility evaluations and recommendations and other requirements as noted in the contractual work order statement.

D. Unanticipated Discoveries (Appendix E), Historic Properties Identification and Procedures for Project Review (Appendix B), Programmatic Mitigation of Effects (Appendix D) are detailed in the appendices as listed.

II. THE DISTRICT'S RESPONSIBILITIES

 A. The District shall serve as the principal authority in matters concerning the interpretation of this agreement, its appendices, and the routine execution of its terms, all subject to the Dispute Resolution (see Stipulation VII). The District, at its discretion, may consult directly with the IA SHPO and ACHP.

B. The District shall ensure that the procedures for Project-specific consultation, historic properties identification and evaluation, assessment of effects, mitigation of adverse effects, and treatment of historic properties are implemented in accordance with procedures outlined in Appendices B and D, or as otherwise negotiated by the Consulting Parties.

C. The District shall ensure that all historic properties investigations, evaluations, treatment plans, and data recovery efforts devised and conducted pursuant to this agreement shall be performed by or under the direct supervision of an individual that meets the Secretary of the Interior's Qualifications Standards (36 CFR Part 61); and shall be performed in a manner that is consistent with Secretary of the Interior's Standards and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa*, and all other Federal or State standards as appropriate.

D. The District shall ensure that documentation submitted to IA SHPO for review meets the standards outlined at 36 CFR 800.11. Pursuant to Section 304 of the NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 307103), the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA; 5 U.S.C. § 552; and Iowa Code 22.7(20)), the District shall withhold from disclosure to the public information relating to the location or character of historic resources when, in consultation with the Iowa OSA, it has been determined that disclosure of such information may create a substantial risk of harm, theft, or destruction to

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such resources or to the area or place where such resources are located, to the extent such withholding is authorized under the FOIA and other Federal laws applicable to the District, or unless directed to release such information by Court Order.

E. The District shall ensure that all archeological reports resulting from actions pursuant to this agreement shall be consistent with the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa*, and to the Department of the Interior's Format Standards for Final Reports of Data Recovery Programs (42 FR 5377-79). Precise location data should be provided only in a separate appendix if it appears that release of such data could jeopardize archeological deposits.

F. The District shall ensure that artifacts, samples, and associated materials (ecofacts) recovered during historic property investigations from federally-owned lands shall be curated, along with all associated records, at the District's regional curation facility in the Illinois State Museum that meets standards established in 36 CFR 79. The Corps shall ensure reasonable availability of curated records and material to future professional and academic research.

III. THE IOWA STATE HISTORIC PRESERVATION OFFICER RESPONSIBILITIES

The IA SHPO shall comment on all activities designated for its review in a timely and efficient manner and in accordance with procedures outlined in Appendices B, D, and E.

IV. UNANTICIPATED DISCOVERIES

The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix E are observed if human remains, associated funerary objects, non-mortuary archeological material, or architectural properties are encountered during construction or archaeological investigations.

V. HISTORIC PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION, EVALUATION AND PROJECT REVIEW

The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix B are observed for all cultural resource investigations, historic properties identification, and project review.

VI. PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

The District shall ensure that the procedures outlined in Appendix D are observed if features of the Project will have an adverse effect on historic properties.

VII. DISPUTE RESOLUTION

- **A.** Should any signatory or concurring party to this PA object at any time to any actions proposed or the manner in which the terms of this agreement are implemented, the District shall consult with such party to resolve the objection. If the District determines that such objection cannot be resolved:
- 1. The District will forward all documentation relevant to the dispute, including the District's proposed resolution, to the ACHP. The ACHP shall provide the District with its advice on the resolution of the objection within 30 days of receiving adequate documentation. Prior to reaching a final decision on the dispute, the District shall prepare a written response that takes into account any timely advice or comments regarding the dispute from the ACHP, signatories and concurring parties, and provide them with a copy of this written response. The District will then proceed according to its final decision.
- **2.** If the ACHP does not provide its advice regarding the dispute within the 30-day time period, the District may make a final decision on the dispute and proceed accordingly. Prior to reaching such a final decision, the District shall prepare a written response in consideration of any timely comments regarding the dispute from the signatories and concurring parties to the Agreement and provide them and the ACHP with a copy of such written response.
- **3.** The District's responsibility to carry out all other actions subject to the terms of this PA that are not subject of the dispute remain unchanged.
- **B.** If the District and the IA SHPO and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, do not agree on NRHP eligibility, or if the Signatories, ACHP, or the National Park Service so request, the District will request a formal determination of eligibility from the Keeper of the NRHP, National Park Service, whose determination shall be final.

VIII. DURATION

This agreement will become void if its terms are not carried out within ten years from the date of its execution. Six months prior to the tenth anniversary of the agreement execution date, the District shall consult with the other signatories to reconsider the terms of the agreement and amend it in accordance with Stipulation X, *Amendments*. The terms of this Agreement shall remain in-force for a period of ten years commencing at the date of its execution. At the end of this period the District shall review the necessity of this Agreement in order to determine whether it should be reissued or allowed to expire. If the Agreement requires reissue, the District shall consult with the IA SHPO in order to ensure compliance with the most current version of the Federal regulations (36 CFR Part 800) implementing Sections 106 and 110(f) of the NHPA (54 U.S.C. § 306108 and 306107). Extension of this agreement duration requires written amendment executed by both Signatories and filed with the ACHP.

IX. TERMINATION

Either of the Signatories to this PA may request a reconsideration of its terms or revoke the agreement upon written notification to the other Signatory providing 30 days' notice. The Signatories will consult in good faith during the period prior to termination to seek agreement on

amendments or other actions that would avoid termination. In the advent of termination, the District will comply with 36 CFR 800.3 through 800.7 regarding individual actions covered by this PA.

X. AMENDMENTS

Either of the Signatories to this PA may request that any or all of its articles be amended after the PA's execution, whereupon the other Signatory will consult in accordance with 36 CFR 800.13, to consider such amendment. The District must notify the ACHP of its intent to amend the Agreement and invite the ACHP's review and comment. The amendment will be effective on the date a copy signed by both Signatories is filed with the ACHP. The District shall ensure that a copy of the amended Agreement is provided to the IA SHPO. The District shall follow the above procedures for amendment if the Undertaking is redefined by the selection of a different alternative or through the adoption of multiple alternatives. Revisions to the appendices shall not require notification of and review by the ACHP. The appendices to the PA can be changed by written concurrence by the District and the IA SHPO. However, the District shall ensure that the ACHP and consulting parties are provided file copies of finalized versions that reflect all revisions.

XI. ANTI-DEFICIENCY ACT

The parties to this agreement acknowledge the District's fiduciary responsibilities pursuant to the Anti-Deficiency Act (31 USC § 1341). This notwithstanding, the District's responsibilities to fulfill the terms of this agreement and to comply with the requirements of the NHPA remain unchanged regardless of the availability or level of funding appropriated for its purposes.

XII. EXECUTION OF THE AGREEMENT

This agreement will become effective upon the District's receipt of signatures on this Agreement by the Signatories. Execution of this agreement by the District and the IA SHPO and the implementation of its terms evidence that the District has considered Project effects on historic properties and has afforded the ACHP an opportunity to comment.




Figure 1. Green Island HREP Project Location Map; Study Area Boundary represents Area of Potential Effect (APE)




Figure 2. APE, Project Feature Concepts, and proposed activity areas included within the Tentatively Selected Plan (TSP).

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APPENDIX B

HISTORIC PROPERTIES IDENTIFICATION, EVALUATION AND PROCEDURES FOR PROJECT REVIEW

I. HISTORIC PROPERTY SURVEYS AND TESTING

Here, and throughout Appendix D, actions taken pursuant to this agreement will occur in consultation with the Consulting Parties. The District will make a reasonable and good faith effort to identify historic properties that are within the Area of Potential Effect (APE) and provide this information, and associated studies or reports to the Consulting Parties as appropriate. This shall be accomplished through the implementation of background archival investigation; geomorphological testing, landform sediment assemblage (LSA) interpretation, and geoarchaeological assessment; historic property surveys and testing and agreed upon treatments of historic properties. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will ensure that the following measures are implemented:

A. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will provide scholarly evidence of stewardship (typically documented in a technical report written by a qualified archeologist or architectural historian) in the recordation, protection, and management of historic properties within the APE through systemic research and studies which have been finalized and approved, then placed in the permanent files of the IA SHPO and IA OSA (as necessary) as evidence of compliance promulgated under Section 106 of the NHPA, as amended and its implementing regulations 36 C.F.R. Part 800: "Protection of Historic Properties."

- B. No archeological historic property survey will be required where the District has documented and IA SHPO concurs that:
- 1. Profound ground surface disturbances have so completely altered the area under consideration as to make the existence of historic properties impossible (e.g., complete stripping of all soils down to sterile subsoil); or,
- 2. Geomorphological investigations indicate deeply buried deposits existing outside of the APE or a very low potential for near surface cultural deposits; or,
- 3. An area previously has been surveyed at the appropriate level of investigation necessary to cover the entire APE utilizing methods consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation* (48 FR 44720-23) and taking into account the National Park Service publication *The Archaeological Survey: Methods and Uses* (1978) and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2022) and has been recommended for acceptance by the IA SHPO.
- C. The District will ensure that the necessary surveys are performed on all areas within the APE indirectly and directly affected by the Undertaking. The District will evaluate historic properties relative to past surveys and reports and properties deemed ineligible with IA SHPO's concurrence based upon the evaluation of the most recent survey; surveys occurring within the last five years that have been recommended for acceptance by the IA SHPO and provide full vertical and horizontal coverage of the APE will not be reevaluated. If a survey results in the identification of properties that are eligible to the NRHP, the District, in consultation with the Signatories and/or Consulting Parties, shall develop and implement plans for the appropriate treatment of historic properties.

D. All surveys will be conducted in a manner consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Identification and Evaluation* (48 FR 44720-23) and take into account the National Park Service publication *The Archaeological Survey: Methods and Uses* (1978) and the most recent version of the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2022). The reconnaissance surveys and subsurface testing will be implemented and reported by the District. The District will then distribute the reports to IA SHPO and other parties, as appropriate, for review and comment.

E. In consultation with the IA SHPO, and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, the District shall evaluate the eligibility of all properties by applying the NRHP criteria (36 CFR 60.4).

- 1. For those properties that the District and the IA SHPO (and in consultation with the THPOs/Tribes, as appropriate) agree are not eligible for nomination to or inclusion in the NRHP, no further investigations of those properties will be required, and the project may proceed in those areas.
- 2. If the survey results in the identification of properties that the District and the IA SHPO and, as appropriate, the THPOs/Tribes, agree are eligible for inclusion on the NRHP, such properties shall be treated in accordance with Section II, *Treatment of Historic Properties*, as appropriate.

II. TREATMENT OF HISTORIC PROPERTIES

The District will ensure that the following guidelines are implemented when dealing with historic properties in the APE. The following does not prevent a consideration of alternatives or modification to listed preferred alternatives. In order of preference:

- A. Avoidance. The preferred treatment for all archeological, historical, and architectural historic properties is avoidance of direct and indirect effects resulting from the Undertaking. All work shall, to the extent feasible, avoid historic properties either through project design changes, use of spatial buffers, temporary fences or barricades during construction, realignments, landscaping, or other measures that the Signatories agree will adequately protect historic properties in both the short-and long-term.
- B. Minimize Effects on Properties Preserved in Place. When the District determines that complete avoidance of historic properties is not feasible, the District shall ensure that alternatives are explored to reduce the magnitude of the effects on the historic properties. Exploration of ways to reduce adverse effects will include the consideration of preservation of historic properties or the protection of historic properties against impacts by project-related activities or long-term effects resulting therefrom in close proximity to the property.
- C. Treatment Plans. Proposed treatment plan should endeavor to minimize effects to historic resources to the greatest extent possible. Proposed plans will be provided to all Signatories for review and comment. Unless the IA SHPO (and, in consultation with the THPOs/Tribes, as appropriate) objects within 30 days of receipt of any plan, the District shall ensure that the treatment plans are implemented. The District shall revise treatment plans in response to comments and recommendations provided by the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and other Consulting Parties so long as the Signatories can agree in writing that they equitably mitigate project effects. Should Signatories not agree, the District will request the ACHP's comments in accordance with Stipulation VII of the PA, *Dispute Resolution*.
- D. Mitigation. When the District, in consultation with the IA SHPO and Consulting Parties as appropriate, determines that project activities will have an adverse effect on a historic

 property(ies), and that avoidance or in-place preservation is not feasible, the District, in consultation with the Signatories, shall ensure that a mitigation plan is developed for these properties in accordance with Appendix E, *Programmatic Mitigation of Effects*. The District will forward such plans to the IA SHPO and Consulting Parties as appropriate, for their review and comment.

PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS

The following does not prevent a consideration of alternatives or modification to listed preferred alternatives.

E. Archeological Data Recovery. The District shall ensure that any NRHP-eligible or-listed archaeological site whose preservation in-place is not feasible is subject to data recovery, following a data recovery plan developed in consultation with the IA SHPO, OSA, and THPOs/Tribes as appropriate, and subject to a 30-day review and comment period. All data recovery plans shall be consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards and Guidelines for Archeological Documentation* (48 FR 44734-37), the *Guidelines for Archaeological Investigations in Iowa* (2022) and take into account the ACHP's publication: *Treatment of Archeological Properties*. Each data recovery plan shall specify, at a minimum:

- 1. the property, properties, or portions of properties where data recovery is to be carried out;
- 2. the research questions to be addressed through the data recovery, with an explanation of their relevance and importance;
- 3. the methods to be used, with an explanation of their relevance to the research questions;
- 4. the methods to be used in analysis, data management, and dissemination of data, including a schedule;
- 5. the proposed disposition of recovered materials and records;
- 6. proposed methods for involving the interested public in the data recovery; and
- 7. a proposed schedule for the submission of progress reports to the IA SHPO, and, where applicable, Consulting Parties.
- G. Historic Properties of Traditional Religious and Cultural Significance
- 1. If a property of traditional religious and cultural significance to Tribes and/or any other groups, or societies is identified within the APE, the District shall develop a treatment plan for that property in consultation with the Signatories and the Consulting Parties that could be affected by proposed activities at the specific historic site or property involved. The plan will cover analysis of treatment options (including consideration of a no build alterative) and selection of a recommended treatment for the property or avoidance and the measures which will be undertaken by the District to ensure that the plan is implemented.
- 2. If responses are not received within 30 days of receipt of the plan by the IA SHPO and affected Consulting Parties, the District shall submit the plan to the IA SHPO and to the affected Consulting Parties and shall implement the plan in accordance with the procedures outlined therein,

3. Should a formal objection to the final plan be submitted within 30 days following its distribution, the District, the IA SHPO, and the affected Consulting Parties shall attempt to resolve the objection. If the objection is not resolved within 90 days, the District shall request the comments of the ACHP or Keeper in accordance with Stipulation VII. *Dispute Resolution*.

- H. Construction. The District shall ensure that the design and specifications for any proposed new construction overlapping with or adjacent to significant historic properties (including those properties deemed eligible to be or already listed on the NRHP), are developed in consultation with the Signatory and Consulting Parties. The District shall ensure that the project design for new construction is technically feasible and economically prudent; is compatible with the historic and architectural qualities of the historic property or district in question in terms of style, scale, massing, color, and materials; and is responsive to the recommended approaches to new construction set forth in the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Rehabilitation* (National Park Service 1983). The District acknowledges that project measures have not been finalized and may change or be modified as economical, operational, engineering, and environmental studies are ongoing. The District will therefore determine effects as directed under Section 106 of the NHPA, as amended and its implementing regulations 36 Part 800: "Protection of Historic Properties." Also, the District will:
- 1. consider the Undertaking's direct and indirect effects, occurring in all construction areas, including the construction zones footprints for dredging, dredge material placement, planting, riprap placement, and any other project-related features and ancillary features proposed.
- 2. consider and coordinate with the IA SHPO, review of areas with the potential for containing deeply buried and submerged historic properties.

APPENDIX C

Pursuant to 36 CFR 800.2(d), 800.3, 800.5(c), and 800.6(a)(2), 800.8(c)(1)(iv) of the NHPA and to meet the responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 Act (42 U.S.C. 4321-4335), the District has developed an Interested and Consulting Parties List comprising 22 Tribes including the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, Forest County Potawatomi Community, Ho-Chunk Nation, Iowa Tribe of Kansas and Nebraska, Iowa Tribe of Oklahoma, Kaw Nation, Kickapoo Tribe in Kansas, Kickapoo Tribe of Oklahoma, Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin, Meskwaki Nation, Miami Tribe of Oklahoma, Omaha Tribe of Nebraska, Otoe-Missouria Tribe, Peoria Tribe of Indians of Oklahoma, Ponca Tribe of Nebraska, Ponca Tribe of Oklahoma, Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation, Prairie Island Indian Community, Sac & Fox Nation of Missouri in Kansas & Nebraska, Sac and Fox Nation of Oklahoma, The Osage Nation, Upper Sioux Community, Minnesota, and the Winnebago Tribe of Nebraska; and three other organizations or agencies including the Iowa SHPO, Iowa OSA, and the ACHP. The District will comply with any requests to be removed from, or added to, the Interested and Consulting Parties List and will continue to develop and maintain the Interested and Consulting Parties List provided herein.

APPENDIX D

PROGRAMMATIC MITIGATION OF EFFECTS PROCEDURES

A. Here, and throughout Appendix E, actions taken pursuant to the agreement will occur in consultation with the Signatories. The District shall provide the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties with letter reports summarizing the alternatives considered to avoid, minimize, or mitigate adverse effects to affected properties in the event adverse effects to such properties cannot be avoided. The IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties may request that the District consider other alternatives to avoid, minimize or mitigate adverse effects.

- B. After the Signatories agree on a proposed alternative to mitigate adverse effects, the Signatories will develop a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) to memorialize the mutually agreed upon strategy. Once these parties have finalized the MOA and as appropriate, received comment from the Consulting Parties, an executed copy will be filed with the ACHP. The District shall ensure that all provisions set forth in each MOA will be carried out. Unanticipated Discoveries are addressed in Appendix C.
- C. Standard mitigation measures to be considered include, but are not limited to, the following:
- 1. Documentation
- a. The District, in consultation with the Signatories, will ensure that the appropriate level of documentation is performed prior to the substantial alteration, relocation, or demolition of any historic building or structure. Documentation shall be consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Architectural and Engineering Documentation* and the *Standards for Historical Documentation* and at a minimum will include: photographs of external façades and internal and external character-defining features, and the completion of new or updated lowa Site Inventory forms.
- b. Unless otherwise agreed to by the IA SHPO in an MOA, the District shall ensure that all documentation is completed, and the District shall ensure this documentation is submitted to the IA SHPO and recommended for acceptance prior to the demolition, alteration, or relocation of the historic building or structure.
- c. The District will provide copies of the documentation to the IA SHPO, appropriate THPOs/Tribes, and other local, county, or state organizations which the IA SHPO recommends.
- 2. Mitigation for Archeological Sites Eligible Other than or in Addition to Criterion D. If preservation in place is not feasible, the District shall consult with the IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes as appropriate, to develop a mitigation plan for any archeological site that is eligible to the NRHP under criteria other than, or in addition to, Criterion D of 36 C.F.R. Part 60. The District shall submit the plan to the IA SHPO and THPOs/Tribes as appropriate for review and comment.
- 3. Alteration and Flood Risk Management Measures Not Adhering to Secretary of the Interior's Standards for Rehabilitation. The District shall consult with the Signatories and Consulting Parties to develop alternate treatment or mitigation plans for those features which cannot meet the Secretary of the Interior's *Standards for Rehabilitation*. The District shall submit these plans to the IA SHPO for review and comment.

4. Other Mitigation Strategies. The District, IA SHPO, THPOs/Tribes, and Consulting Parties shall consult to devise other mitigation strategies in instances where those included in this agreement do not satisfactorily mitigate adverse effects to historic properties. It may be necessary to develop separate MOAs for effects on specific historic properties.

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APPENDIX E

UNANTICIPATED DISCOVERY

Here, and throughout Appendix D, actions taken pursuant to this agreement will occur in consultation with the Signatories and Consulting Parties.

A. Human Remains. Iowa law protects all human remains regardless of their historical age, sex, or cultural/ethnic affiliation.

- 1. In the event that human remains are encountered during archeological investigations or construction activities, work shall cease within 50 meters of the remains, appropriate steps shall be taken to secure the site, and officials at the District, the Bioarchaeology Program at the Iowa Office of the State Archaeologist (IA OSA), and the IA SHPO shall be notified and, to the best of their ability, shall respond within three (3) working days to such notification in order to determine the next course of action that ensures the applicable Iowa law is followed. At the District, this official shall be an Archeologist in the Environmental Compliance or Planning branches, or their designee. At the IA OSA, this official shall be the Bioarchaeology Program Director or their designee. At the IA SHPO, this official shall be a Review Archaeologist.
- 2. If the remains appear to be ancient (i.e., older than 150 years), and are determined to be ethnically Native American, the District shall be responsible for adhering to the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act [NAGPRA (P.L. 101-601; 25 U.S.C. 3001-3013;104 Stat. 3048-3058)]. The IA OSA shall have jurisdiction to ensure that the appropriate procedures in accordance with applicable lowa law (Code of Iowa, Sections 263B, 523I.316.6 and 716.5; IAC 685, Ch.11.1) are observed, but are not financially responsible for costs incurred during this process. The disposition of the remains will be arranged in accordance with NAGPRA and Chapter 263B of the Iowa Code.
- 3. Human remains less than 150 years old that are determined to be ethnically Native American are protected under the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (P.L. 101-601; 25 USC 3001-3013) and Chapter 523I of the Iowa Code. The District shall be responsible for adhering to these laws. In the event that human remains appearing less than 150 years in age are encountered, the District shall ensure that appropriate law enforcement authorities and the Iowa Department of Health are notified. The IA OSA shall ensure that appropriate procedures in accordance with applicable Iowa law are observed but are not financially responsible for costs incurred during this process.
- 4. Before work can resume within 50 meters of the human remains, the District must determine the NRHP eligibility of the archeological resource in consultation with the IA SHPO and tribal representatives, as applicable.
- 5. Upon a determination of eligibility, and decision to preserve in place by the IA OSA, or designee, the District shall submit a plan for avoidance and protection to the District for review and comment. The District will provide the proposed plan to all Consulting Parties. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven (7) working days to provide comments to the District on the proposed plan for final approval.
- 6. Upon a determination of eligibility by the District, and decision to remove the human remains by the IA OSA, or their designee, the IA OSA shall submit a plan for relocation and recovery of information to the District for review and comment. The District will provide the proposed plan to

all Consulting Parties. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven (7) working days to provide comments to the District on the proposed plan for further consideration.

- 7. Work within 50 meters of the human remains shall resume upon the development and approval of an appropriate relocation and data recovery plan, other recommended mitigation procedures, or agreement among the District, IA OSA and IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation.
- B. Archaeological Material (non-mortuary related). The District shall ensure that the following procedures are observed in the event that previously undetected non mortuary-related archeological materials are encountered.
- 1. All activities within 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery shall cease immediately, appropriate steps shall be implemented to secure the site, and the District and IA SHPO shall be notified of the discovery and shall respond within five working days to such notification. Construction work may continue in the area outside the 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery provided that archaeological investigations have demonstrated the absence of features/ deposits in those areas.
- 2. An archeologist retained by the District will inspect the work site and determine the extent of the affected archeological resource within five working days of its discovery.
- 3. Before work can resume within 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery, the District must determine the NRHP eligibility and boundaries of the archeological resource in consultation with the IA SHPO and other Consulting Parties, as applicable.
- 4. Upon an evaluation of eligibility, the District or their designee shall submit a plan for avoidance, protection, recovery of information, or destruction without data recovery to the SHPO for review and comment within 20 working days. The District will notify all Consulting Parties of the unanticipated discovery and provide the proposed treatment plan for their consideration. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven working days to provide comments on the proposed treatment plan upon receipt of the information.
- 5. Work within 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery shall resume upon either:
- a. The development, approval, and implementation of an appropriate data recovery plan, other recommended mitigation procedures, or agreement among the District and the IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation; or,
- b. Agreement by the IA SHPO and the District that the newly located archeological is not eligible for inclusion on the NRHP.
- c. If the District and IA SHPO object to any part of the treatment plan and they are not able to reach resolution of the objection within seven working days of when the objection is raised, the District shall follow the procedures outlined in Stipulation VII of the PA, *Dispute Resolution*.
- C. Adverse Effects upon Architectural Properties. The District shall ensure that the following procedures are observed in the event that post-review effects to historic buildings, structures, objects, or districts are identified.

- 1. Work within 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery shall cease and the District shall notify the IA SHPO of the discovery and the IA SHPO will respond within five working days to such notification. Construction work may continue in the area outside the 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery provided previous survey has demonstrated that no other properties are present.
- 2. An architectural historian retained by the District will inspect the work site and evaluate the National Register eligibility of the property within seven working days. The District, in consultation with the District, shall assess the project effects. The District shall provide its report of findings and determination of effect to the IA SHPO who shall have seven working days to provide comments.
- 3. Upon assessment of adverse effect, the District shall submit a plan for after the-fact mitigation to the District for review and comment. The District will notify all Consulting Parties of the unanticipated discovery and provide the plan for their consideration. The IA SHPO and Consulting Parties will have seven working days to provide comments on the plan upon its receipt. The District may implement the plan if IA SHPO fails to respond within the allotted timeframe provided that no concerns have been raised by other consulting parties.
- 4. Work within 50 meters of the unanticipated discovery shall resume upon either:
- a. Agreement by the District and the IA SHPO that the effects are not adverse; or,
- b. The development, approval, and implementation of an appropriate plan, or agreement among the District and the IA SHPO that the site does not warrant mitigation.
- c. If the District and IA SHPO object to any part of the plan and they are not able to reach resolution of the objection within seven working days of when the objection is raised, the District shall follow the procedures outlined in Stipulation VII, *Dispute Resolution*.
- D. Failure to Act within Specified Timeframe. If any principal signatory fails to meet the timeframes set in Appendix C, *Unanticipated Discoveries*, the District may proceed to final decision-making provided that such is consistent with controlling State and Federal laws and regulations

Kyle,

I talked with Matt and it appears that your project may fall under NWP27. As long as this Green Island project includes the restoration, enhancement, and establishment of non-tidal wetlands and riparian areas, provided those activities result in net increases in aquatic resource functions and services.

To be authorized by this NWP, the aquatic habitat restoration, enhancement, or establishment activity must be planned, designed, and implemented so that it results in aquatic habitat that resembles an ecological reference. An ecological reference may be based on the characteristics of one or more intact aquatic habitats or riparian areas of the same type that exist in the region. An ecological reference may be based on a conceptual model developed from regional ecological knowledge of the target aquatic habitat type or riparian area. Activities authorized by this NWP include, but are not limited to the removal of accumulated sediments; releases of sediment from reservoirs to maintain sediment transport continuity to restore downstream habitats; the installation, removal, and maintenance of small water control structures, dikes, and berms, as well as discharges of dredged or fill material to restore appropriate stream channel configurations after small water control structures, dikes, and berms are removed; the installation of current deflectors; the enhancement, rehabilitation, or re-establishment of riffle and pool stream structure; the placement of in-stream habitat structures; modifications of the stream bed and/or banks to enhance, rehabilitate, or re-establish stream meanders; the removal of stream barriers, such as undersized culverts, fords, and grade control structures; the backfilling of artificial channels; Page 10 of 41 the removal of existing drainage structures, such as drain tiles, and the filling, blocking, or

reshaping of drainage ditches to restore wetland hydrology; the installation of structures or fills necessary to restore or enhance wetland or stream hydrology; the construction of small nesting islands; the construction of open water areas; the construction of oyster habitat over unvegetated bottom in tidal waters; coral restoration or relocation activities; shellfish seeding; activities needed to reestablish vegetation, including plowing or discing for seed bed preparation and the planting of appropriate wetland species; re-establishment of submerged aquatic vegetation in areas where those plant communities previously existed; re-establishment of tidal wetlands in tidal waters where those wetlands previously existed; mechanized land clearing to remove non-native invasive, exotic, or nuisance vegetation; and other related activities. Only native plant species should be planted at the site. This NWP authorizes the relocation of non-tidal waters, including non-tidal wetlands and streams, on the project site provided there are net increases in aquatic resource functions and services. Except for the relocation of non-tidal waters on the project site, this NWP does not authorize the conversion of a stream or natural wetlands to another aquatic habitat type (e.g., the conversion of a stream to wetland or vice versa) or uplands. Changes in wetland plant communities that occur when wetland hydrology is more fully restored during wetland rehabilitation activities are not considered a conversion to another aquatic habitat type.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Rock Island District (District) is requesting concurrence from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service the proposed Tree Planting and Tree Thinning feature on Iowa Department of Natural Resources (IADNR) managed land, Green Island Habitat Rehabilitation and Enhancement Project, RM 548.5-546 Pool 13, *May Affect but Not Likely to Adversely Affect* (NLAA) the endangered tricolored bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*) and northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*).

The proposed areas are located in the Green Island Wildlife Management Area (GIWMA), Jackson County, Iowa (Enclosure 1). Tree thinning and planting efforts are on Iowa Department of Natural Resources managed land, Green Island Habitat Rehabilitation and Enhancement Project, RM 548.5-546, Pool 13. This project will promote growth of preferred trees by opening the canopy, reduce undesirable species, increase desirable species for pollinators, and promote habitat for bats. The silvicultural prescription will include tree cutting, occurring as needed in new feature locations, however, all other dead or dying trees will be left providing habitat for bats. In addition, trees would be planted bolstering the forested areas of the project and positively increasing bottomland hard wood regeneration.

All cutting proposed for these areas would only occur during the "cut season," from October 1 through March 31, to avoid the tricolored bat and northern long-eared bat roosting period.

The District carefully reviewed the FWS's Information for Planning and Consultation (IPaC) website for a list of species and critical habitat that "may be present" within the project areas (Consultation Code 2023-0092972). No designated critical habitat for any listed species is present in the project areas or vicinity. There are seven species listed for GIWMA: tricolored bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*), northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*), eastern prairie fringed orchid (*Platanthera leucophaea*), Candidate monarch butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*), higgins eye pearly mussel (*Lampsilis higginsii*), sheepnose mussel (*Plethobasus cyphyus*), and an Experimental Population whooping crane (*Grus americana*). Given the habitat requirements, the District determined there will be no effect on eastern prairie fringed orchid, monarch butterfly, sheepnose mussel, higgins eye, and whooping crane.

The District concluded the project *May Affect but Not Likely to Adversely Affect* the tricolored bat and northern long-eared bat. If new information becomes available or if the project is altered, the District will review and revise this determination as necessary. The District is requesting your concurrence with this determination and seeks your timely response.



This responds to you request for U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) concurrence with your "may affect, not likely to adversely affect" determinations for the northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*) and tricolored bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*) associated with the proposed tree removal related to the Green Island Habitat Rehabilitation and Enhancement Project (HREP) Tentatively Selected Plan (TSP), as described in your letter dated July 25, 2023. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) project is located within the Green Island Wildlife Management Area which is located within Pool 13 of the Upper Mississippi River, approximate river mile 546-548.5, near Green Island, Jackson County, Iowa and managed by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. According to the April 3, 2023 TSP Milestone presentation, the purpose of the proposed project is to restore the historic hydrologic cycle; restore quality, quantity, and diversity of vegetation; improve sediment management; increase quality and quantity of aquatic habitat; and restore bathymetric and topographic diversity. Your letter dated July 25, 2023 also notes that this project will promote the growth of preferred tree species by opening the canopy, reducing undesirable species, increasing desirable species for pollinators, and promoting habitat for bats.

Proposed measures for this project outlined in the TSP Milestone presentation include the installation of a sediment trap and water pump station in addition to the creation of overwintering dredge cuts for fish, channels to connect the dredge cuts, berms, an area of ridge and swale, and tree planting. Equipment will be brought in using existing access roads and staged in existing parking lots. Tree clearing will occur as needed in new feature locations, specifically the ridge and swale areas covering approximately 127 acres, and the dredge cuts covering approximately 42 acres according to email correspondence received July 26, 2023. The planting of new trees will occur across a portion of the ridge and swale area as well as an additional 160 acres. Proposed conservation measures identified in the July 25, 2023 letter and via email on August 30, 2023 indicate that all tree clearing in these feature locations and the removal of any trees that might fall on the newly planted trees would occur during the "cut season" from October 1 through March 31 to avoid the bat roosting period. Additionally, all dead or dying trees outside of the feature footprints will be left standing to provide additional habitat for roosting bats and some trees will be planted in the forested areas to support bottomland hardwood regeneration. This informal consultation addresses potential effects to the species in accordance with section 7 of the Endangered Species Act of

1973 (Act), as amended (16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.) and 50 CFR § 402 of our interagency regulations governing section 7 of the Act.

Threatened and Endangered Species

Seven federal threatened or endangered species currently have ranges overlapping the action area including the northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*), eastern prairie fringed orchid (*Platanthera leucophaea*), Higgins eye pearlymussel (*Lampsilis higginsii*), and sheepnose mussel (*Plethobasus cyphyus*), along with one species that the Service has proposed to list as endangered, the tricolored bat (*Perimyotis subflavus*), one candidate species, the Monarch butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*), and an experimental non-essential population of whooping crane (*Grus americana*). There is currently no designated critical habitat in the action area. Of the species listed above, you determined the project "may affect, but not likely to adversely affect" northern long-eared bat and tricolored bat and would have "no effect" on all other species. The Illinois-Iowa Ecological Services Field Office has no regulatory or statutory authority for concurring with "no effect" determinations. However, we recommend you maintain a written record of your "no effect" determination and include it in your decision record. Northern Long-eared Bat and Tricolored Bat

The Service is not aware of any recent bat surveys conducted within the floodplain forests of Pool 13, though surveys have recently been conducted in Pools 12 and 14. A mist netting and emergence survey was conducted for the Pool 12 Overwintering HREP in 2015, resulting in the capture and tracking of several northern long-eared bats to roost sites near Tippy Lake (RM 571-572). In Pool 14, acoustic and mist net surveys conducted in 2015 for the Beaver Island HREP identified northern long-eared, tricolored, and the federally endangered Indiana bat (*Myotis Sodalis*). Northern long-eared and tricolored bats were also detected during a season-long acoustic survey conducted at Princeton Wildlife Management Area (RM 504-507) in 2018, but species presence could not be verified through mist-netting. Potentially suitable roosting habitat exists within the forested areas of the Green Island Wildlife Management Area, though we are not aware of any known roost sites. Due the known presence of northern long-eared and tri-colored bats within the vicinity and the potentially suitable roosting habitat, we assume presence of both species within the action area.

Project actions that have the potential to affect northern long-eared bat and tricolored bat include the clearing of any trees within the dredge cuts and ridge and swale footprints, as well as the clearing of any trees that may fall on new plantings. The majority of the dredge cut and ridge and swale areas are currently unforested. Additionally, the Corps proposes to conduct all tree clearing between the dates of October 1 through March 31, outside of the bat maternity roosting season. Due to this timing, removal of unidentified maternity roost trees is unlikely to result in incidental take of either bat species. Furthermore, the proposed tree clearing accounts for a fraction of the surrounding available forested habitat and is not expected to result in habitat fragmentation. We also anticipate that the planned tree planting will improve future forest stand health and regeneration. Forest inventory surveys conducted to inform the project indicate average tree health in the action area has severely declined. There are currently many standing dead trees that could provide suitable roosting habitat in the near future, but it is anticipated that many of these will eventually fall and habitat availability for bats will decline without these timber stand improvement techniques.

For these reasons, the Service concurs with your determination that the project, as proposed, "may affect, but is not likely to adversely affect" the northern long-eared bat and tricolored bat (proposed endangered). It is important to note that while the range for the federally endangered Indiana bat (*Myotis sodalis*) does not currently overlap the action area, the Illinois counties of Carroll and Jo Daviess are included in the range and directly across the Mississippi River from the project. Should the project be modified, or new information indicate endangered species may be affected, consultation should be reinitiated. Additionally,

we expect a final listing decision for the tricolored bat by October 1, 2023. If this final listing decision occurs prior to completion of the action, the Corps must review the action to determine whether further consultation is required. Generally, consultation would be required if the action is not yet complete *and* if it may still result in effects to the species. At that time, the Service will review and confirm whether this concurrence is still appropriate. The development of significant new information or significant changes to the federal action that would alter the basis for our concurrence could warrant further coordination to ensure that appropriate steps are taken to conclude consultation. Finally, the little brown bat (*Myotis lucifugus*), is currently under review and a listing decision may occur prior to the initiation of project construction. Please also re-initiate consultation, as appropriate, following release of this final listing determination if it occurs.

Migratory Birds

Additionally, the Service removed bald eagles from protection under the Endangered Species Act on August 8, 2007. However, they remain protected today under the Migratory Birds Treaty Act and the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act (Eagle Act). The Eagle Act prohibits take, which is defined as, "pursue, shoot, shoot at, poison, wound, kill, capture, trap, collect, destroy, molest, or disturb" (50 CFR 22.3). Disturb is defined in regulations as, "to agitate or bother a bald or golden eagle to a degree that causes, or is likely to cause, based on the best scientific information available, 1) injury to an eagle, or 2) decrease in its productivity, by substantially interfering with normal breeding, feeding, or sheltering behavior." Please contact the Region 3 Migratory Bird Office (https://www.fws.gov/program/eagle-management/contact-us) should activities that have the potential to result in take or disturbance of eagles or their nests.
