WELCOME TO CORALVILLE LAKE

We are happy to have you here with us. Coralville Lake, managed by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, offers multiple fun outdoor activities for visitors to enjoy. Whether you are here to enjoy one of the campgrounds, or visit one of our day use areas, this guide contains maps and important information about the land. Stop by one of our campfire programs, or take a walk on one of our trails. Whatever you choose to do, stay safe and have fun!

Back in the 1930s, record floods that swept the nation prompted Congress to establish the Flood Control Act of 1938. In an attempt to reduce flooding on the Mississippi River, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers was authorized to construct several dams on tributary rivers, including the Iowa River. The Iowa River is one of several southeastern flowing streams that drain the eastern one-half of Iowa to join the Mississippi River along the states eastern boundary. Construction of the Coralville Lake Dam began in 1949 and was completed in 1958. In addition to moderating stream flows on the Iowa River, Coralville Lake's less evident, but equally important, role is in the comprehensive flood control system for the Mississippi River. Coralville Dam regulates runoff from 3,084 square miles of land upstream providing flood protection to 1,703 square miles of Iowa River Valley below the dam. During drought conditions, water stored in the lake is released at a minimum rate of 150 cubic feet per second (cfs) to provide a sufficient flow to meet downstream domestic and industrial water needs. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers manages Coralville Lake as a multiple use project providing primary benefits in flood risk management and low flow augmentation, and secondary benefits in recreation, fish and wildlife management, and forest management.

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GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- 1. No parking on grass, roadway shoulders, or empty campsites.
- 2. All of the following items are prohibited: loaded firearms, explosives, ammunition, bows and arrows or other projectile-firing devices, and fireworks.
- 3. Other prohibited items: bounce houses, swimming pools, and Chinese lanterns.
- 4. No moving of firewood. Protect your forests from tree killing pests by purchasing your firewood locally and burning on-site. Visit <u>dontmovefirewood.org</u> for further information.
- 5. All boats must be removed from the water each day. Boats are not permitted to be moored on the shoreline while not in use.

- 6. Visitors must check-in at the Fee Booth prior to setting up on their reserved campsite.
- 7. Three camping units are permitted per site: One recreational vehicle and two tents, or three tents per campsite.
- 8. Up to six occupants are permitted per site.
- 9. Check-out time is 12:00 PM, Check-in time is 2:00 PM.
- 10. Pets must be penned, on a leash under six feet in length, or otherwise physically restrained.
- 11. Quiet hours are from 10:00 PM 6:00 AM.
- 12. Vehicles with license plates only.





























TRAILS

CORALVILLE LAKE



Whether you have an hour or a weekend, these trails can be enjoyed any time of the year. These areas are constantly changing with the seasons, making each visit special. Dogs must be on a 6ft or shorter leash on all trails.

PROGRAMS

CORALVILLE LAKE

The United States Government owns a total of 24,591 acres of land for the Coralville Lake Project. This land includes 5 distinct habitats; forest, water, man dominated (cultivated or developed), wetland, and prairie habitats. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers directly manages 8,619 acres of this land, while the remaining 15,972 acres is managed by partnering organizations. These acres serve as a refuge for plants and animals that otherwise would have been displaced by agriculture and urbanization.

DEVONIAN FOSSIL GORGE

Imagine walking on a 375 million year old ocean floor! This glimpse into Iowa's geologic past was first exposed during the Flood of 1993 at Coralville Lake, then further exposed during the Flood of 2008. The fossil and limestone bedrock of the Devonian Fossil Gorge date back almost 200 million years before the dinosaurs. Visit the fossil gorge to see all the fossils up close and to take a photo next to Dunkleosteous, an armored plated fish who is thought of as the "T-Rex of the sea".



The removal of, or damage to the fossils is strictly prohibited and subject to a fine.

- Parents/Guardians are responsible for making sure their children are in the right sized life jacket. If the size is incorrect, the life jacket will not work effectively.
- Borrower assumes all responsibility and liability of life jacket use/non-use.
- Borrower will not hold liable any party involved in the distribution of life jackets.
- Borrower must inspect life jacket prior to use to make sure life jacket is in good working condition.
- Return life jackets to this station before leaving the park!











Playing in, on, and around the water can be a lot of fun, but you need to keep safety in mind. Drowning is one of the leading causes of accidental death for children. Wearing a life jacket has proven to be the best safety measure when on or around water. At Coralville Lake, there is no charge to borrow a life jacket from one of our Life Jacket Loaner Stations located at Coralville Lake beaches and boat ramps. Make sure to choose the right life jacket based on the weight of the person wearing the life vest. For more safety tips, go online to bobber.info to learn more from Bobber the Water Safety Dog.

HUNTING AND FISHING

There are many outdoor recreation opportunities here at Coralville Lake. Hunting, fishing, and trapping are permitted in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local laws except in areas designated as "No Hunting" by the District Engineer. 
Named after Thomas Macbride, the "father" of Iowa conservation, Lake Macbride State Park is a popular lakeside destination with family friendly outdoor activities. Several multi-use trails wind around the lake, featuring the sights and sounds of Iowa's native birds. In the summer, soak up the sun by kayaking, paddling or swimming in the lake. Whether you are visiting for an afternoon or a weekend, Lake Macbride features numerous amenities to enjoy year round. Iowa's largest State Park (2,180 Acres) is located in the wooded valleys of Mill and Jordan creeks, Lake Macbride is certain to meet the needs of outdoor enthusiasts. Whether you are here to explore, boat, fish, camp, or picnic, enjoy your visit.



Lake Macbride is split into two units. The northern unit is located at the end of County Road F-16, 4 miles west of Solon, and features a modern campground, boat ramps, beach, boat rental, picnic areas, and the park office. The southern unit is located off County Road F-28 by Fifth Street in Solon. This unit includes a non-modern campground, boat ramps, picnic areas, and numerous prairies.

MODERN CAMPING


LAKE MACBRIDE

Lake Macbride's modern campground opens April 1st and closes November 15th. It features a shower and restroom facility, back-in site pads complete with 20, 30, and 50 amp electrical service at each site, picnic tables and fire rings. Eleven sites have full hook-ups, and an additional 17 sites have hydrants for potable water. From May 1st to October 15th, full hook-up sites are \$35 per night and all other sites are \$25. Before and after this time, prices are reduced to \$20 per site. 100% of these sites are reservable with same-day reservations available.




PRIMITIVE CAMPING

LAKE MACBRIDE

The primitive campground in the southern portion of the park opens April 1st and closes November 15th. It offers 57 campsites, with both flush and non-flush restrooms. This campground is situated in a shaded and semi-timbered area near the lake. During the recreational season (May 1st to Oct 15th) all sites are \$12 per night. Before and after this time, all sites are \$10. One organized youth group site is available for \$25/night. Interested campers may reserve a site in this campground by calling toll free (877) 427-2757 or going online at www.iowastateparks.reserveamerica.com 100% of these sites are reservable with same-day reservations available.

SHELTER INFORMATION

The Civilian Conservative Corps constructed a number of facilities at Lake Macbride in the 1930's including a beautiful enclosed stone shelter. The enclosed Main Lodge shelter (day use only) is available for rent for \$250 per holiday or weekend day plus tax (\$125 for weekdays), which includes electricity, water, modern restrooms, kitchen facilities, and oak tables and benches. The main lodge may be reserved online at the website below. Three open picnic shelters are also available for rent. Shelters with electricity can be reserved for \$35/day plus tax and \$25/day for those facilities without electricity.

HIKING AT LAKE MACBRIDE


A five mile crushed limestone multiuse trail is located on the north side of the lake and connects the park to the community of Solon. While a majority of this trail runs along the shoreline of Lake Macbride, several portions pass through oak/hickory forest or alongside restored Iowa prairie. More than seven miles of additional hiking trails await your visit, inlcuding one especially scenic crushed limestone trail that extends 1.25 miles between the beach and Lake Macbride's dam.

SWIMMING AND BOATING

Lake Macbride's beach, located in the northern unit of the park, is the perfect place to cool off or simply relax and enjoy the view. No lifeguards are provided, so park visitors may swim at their own risk. Swimming is restricted to the designated beach area only, and alcohol is prohibited.

A variety of boats are available for rent. The boat rental office is open daily from 9 AM to 7 PM between Memorial Day and Labor Day. Reservations can be made by calling (319) 624-2315. Pontoon boats seat up to 8 passengers and rent for \$50-\$55 an hour. Paddleboats, canoes, kayaks, and paddleboards rent for \$12-\$16 an hour. A variety of concessions are available at the boat rental. Firewood is also for sale.

There are seven boat ramps on Lake Macbride. Please see the area map for ramp locations. A 10 horsepower motor limit is in effect from the Friday before Memorial Day through Labor Day. At other times there is an unrestricted horsepower motor limit operated at no-wake speed (5 mph maximum speed). Beach closures of up to two hours are possible on weekends and holidays at Lake Macbride State Park due to high visitation and limited parking at the beach area. During these times, vehicles will be stopped at the park entrance and asked to return to the beach at a later time, or asked to visit one of the other beaches in Johnson County such as Sugar Bottom, West Overlook, or Kent Park. Lake Macbride beach hours are 8 AM to 7 PM daily. Make weekend and holiday plans accordingly.





INTERESTING HISTORY

Lake Macbride, currently encompassing over 800 surface acres offers countless recreational opportunities for all who visit. However, this is after many years of changes. Lake Macbride State Park officially opened in 1937 after over 4 years of construction and many more years of planning. Much of the original development was completed by the Civilian Conservation Corp (CCC), and the Works Progress Administration (WPA) from 1933 to 1938. Originally, Lake Macbride was only 200 acres in size, surrounded by over 800 acres of park property. The park and lake changed to its current configuration in 1957 in efforts to remain separate from Coralville Lake, which was being built "next door" along the Iowa River. From 2000-2002, we once again saw changes during a major lake renovation project in the form of shoreline protection, silt retention structures, jetties and additional fish habitat. 
FISHING

LAKE MACBRIDE

In both Lake Macbride and Coralville Lake, you can expect to find largemouth bass, walleye, bluegill, crappie and channel catfish. In order to fish, you need to purchase an annual fishing license for \$22. (One-week or one-day licenses also are available. Fees are higher for out-of-state residents.) Purchase your license at various stores in the area, including Casey's, BP, Sam's Main Street Market in Solon, L.D. Express in North Liberty, Fin and Feather in Iowa City, Scheels, Iowa River Outdoors or Walmart in Coralville. Or purchase and print a fishing license from the DNR website, iowadnr.gov. Or you can call (800) 367-1188. Anglers are sure to appreciate the fish grinder at the fish-cleaning station in the Primitive Campground. You do not need to be camping at the Primitive Campground to use the grinder, and it can handle up to a 10-pound fish. Check out takemefishing.org for info about what's biting and to get hooked on fishing.

FISHING FAQS:

How old do I need to be to buy a license?

• 16 years of age. Kids under 16 don't need a license to fish, but may need to purchase a trout fee.

How much does a fishing license cost?

- \$22 for an annual fishing license; 7-day \$15.50; 1-day \$10.50.
- Non Iowa residents pay \$12 for one-day; \$20.50 for 3-day; \$37.50 for 7-day; and \$48 for an annual license.

How many fish can I catch?

- Daily bag limits: Crappie-25; Bluegill-25; Largemouth Bass-3; Walleye-5; Catfish-8 on Macbride, Catfish-15 on Coralville; Muskellunge-1; White bass/Wipers-none
- Length limits: Panfish-none; Largemouth Bass-15" minimum; Walleye-none; Catfish-none; Muskellunge-40"; White bass/Wipers-none
- Two lines maximum, unless you pay \$14 for an annual

BOAT SAFETY

- Take a safe boating course.
- Put on your life jacket and leave your alcohol behind.
- Check the weather forecast.
- File a float plan with a friend.
- Check your boat for all required safety equipment.
- Check your electrical system and fuel system for gas fumes.
- Follow manufacturer-suggested procedures before starting up.
- Carry a navigational chart and know your waterway.
- Follow the navigation rules of the road, buoys, and other aids to navigation.
- Be a safe boater, always post a sharp lookout.

Iowa's boating speed and distance regulations:

- Don't exceed 5 mph within 100 feet of craft going 5 mph or less.
- Keep a distance of 50 feet when both are going over 5 mph.
- Don't exceed 10 mph when vision is not clear 200 feet ahead.
