News from Around the Project

THE “OFF SEASON” OF A PARK RANGER

Ask any park ranger the question, “what do you do in the off season” and the answer will be, “what off-season!” During the recreation months, typically April through October, we are very busy with visitor assistance, conducting tours and interpretive programs, park and service contract management and keeping up with the day-to-day operations of the parks. As our recreation season comes to a close in October, the “off season” of a park ranger begins.

As the last campers leave our parks, we are busy right away closing campgrounds and winterizing them to protect against damage from cold winter temperatures. By this time, preparations are being made for annual eagle watch events which we present in January. Fall maintenance projects, property inventories, and end of year reports are a high priority at this time as well. Preparations begin on our annual Along the River publication, which is a guide to recreation for the Mississippi River Project.

At the Mississippi River Visitor Center on the Rock Island Arsenal, historic Clock Tower Building tours and historic Arsenal Island tours are conducted through October and November. Clock Tower/Eagle Watch tours start in January and run through February. The rangers at the Visitor Center are also involved in conducting eagle counts during the winter months to help track the number of eagles present along the river. Many school and other interpretive programs are scheduled during the winter months as well.

As the snow begins to fly, we are busy working on next year’s service contract bids for services in our parks such as grass mowing, cleaning and fee collection. During November, the park ranger staff meets for an annual fall conference, at which time we report on the concluded recreation season and start the planning process for the next recreation season.

Late December and early January mark the beginning of our boundary line inspections along portions of the river. Park rangers walk our boundary line to make sure they are marked with orange boundary posts. They also look for unauthorized activity that might be happening on public lands such as building of structures, storage of personal property and damage to public lands. Other tasks started in January include planning and scheduling the interpretive programming in our campgrounds, lining up volunteers to help in our parks and holding our eagle watches.



As we head into February, we attend annual forestry meetings to discuss upcoming forestry projects, review past projects and take a look at future forestry program needs. The service contracts for the next recreation season are filled and pre-work meetings are held with all service contractors who will be performing services in our parks. Park rangers meet in February to complete yearly training and discuss plans for the upcoming recreation season. Staffed by park rangers, the Corps of Engineers has a booth at the RV, Camping and Travel Show and the Hunting, Fishing and Outdoor Show held at the Quad Cities Conservation Alliance (QCCA) Expo Center in Rock Island, IL.



When March rolls around, the focus is on checking our parks for safety and maintenance work that needs to be completed to ensure our parks will be safe and open on time. Park rangers are busy in March and April putting on Illinois Safe Boating classes. Another common occurrence during these months is keeping a close eye on the river and its flooding potential due to snowmelt and rainwater. The Mississippi River Project and its staff work together to ensure our parks, facilities and equipment are flood proof and safe. The safety of our visitors and facilities are our number one priority.

As you can see, the winter months for a park ranger are where the behind the scenes preparation work is done. To a park ranger, the "off season" means the next recreation season is just around the corner.

All along the river, there are people who live, work and recreate in and around the US Army Corps of Engineers Mississippi River Project. Some of these people have taken a real interest in the beauty of the river and strive to share that with others while enjoying it in some new and adventurous ways. In this month's newsletter we would like to share with you some of the things that these river loving people have shared with us.



David C. Adams pictured on the left has lived near our Blanding Landing Campground for last 28 years. He was employed as a housing director for a college of hearing impaired students and which allowed him to have his summers off. He is a long time camper with the Corps on the Mississippi River, way back to when camping was free at our parks. Blanding Landing was always his favorite place to camp. Although he does not camp at our parks much anymore because he lives within walking distance, he remembers are parks as clean, mowed, and with no graffiti. He also remembers the caretakers and Rangers as being friendly and helpful.

Over the course of those 28 years of living along the river, he got big into canoeing and kayaking the Mississippi in pool 12. In April of 2010 he took on a new venture and became a stand up paddle boarder. It is very popular along the coasts and involves an oversized surfboard with a very big paddle. If the wind makes waves then he is able to surf them with a 4 ft "windpaddle" along with a sail that attaches to his stand up paddle board.

While out on the water he enjoys taking great wildlife photos and his pictures have won many prizes in local contests. David was recently interviewed for a book soon to be released titled "The Art of StandUp Paddling, a Complete Guide to StandUp Paddling on Lakes, Rivers, and Oceans" by Ben Marcus. David will be in the river section of the book along with one of his great otter photos taken out on the river just south of Blanding Landing Campground.



During the winter months, David cross country ski's on the river's edge, but never too far from the river bank. Whether he is mountain biking, cross country skiing, canoeing, kayaking, or standup paddling, David has always has a deep appreciation for the recreational opportunities in and along the Mississippi River.

2011 A YEAR IN REVIEW

On October 23 the Thomson Park Rangers put an end to the official 2011 camping season. The past seven months have presented many highs and lows for recreation along the Mississippi River. We recorded the sixth highest flood on record for pool 13 of the Mississippi River and experienced windstorms that caused significant damage to trees. We had a safe camping season with few incidents throughout all our recreation areas. Although the Thomson Causeway remained closed most of the season, in September we were able to open the campground and accommodate campers for two months of tremendous weather.

All the work that needs to be completed can seem like a never ending process but with a great staff and dedicated volunteers we were able to keep moving forward. Our maintenance crew was able to install a new dock at Cattail Slough Recreation Area, south of Fulton, IL. With the Dock and new CXT vault toilet at the area the Thomson Ranger staff heard nothing but great reviews for the park, and most importantly, an increase in visitation at the boat ramp. The construction at Thomson Causeway Recreation is nearing completion. We now have three updated shower facilities, a three lane dump station and a walk up dump station to better accommodate visitors.
