# **Summer Heat Arrives for Holiday Weekend**

Earlier this year high water and cool temperatures kept many people from enjoying the river for much of the spring and summer season. The upcoming Labor Day holiday is predicted to be sunny and warm which is great for those looking to get out and enjoy the water. The US Army Corps of Engineers, Mississippi River Project would like to stress the importance of safety for all who look to recreate on the water this holiday weekend.

Prevent accidents and fatalities by reviewing the following safety tips:

- Designate an operator. Do not drink and operate a boat.
- Wear a life jacket. Children under 13 are required by law to wear a life jacket but it's recommended for everyone.



- Don't overload a boat with people or equipment. Check on the capacity plate for the maximum weight or the maximum number of people the boat can safely carry.
- Check to make sure your equipment is running properly and you have all the required safety equipment on board.
- Use navigation charts to safely get around on the river. You can download them for free from our website. Visit <u>www.missriver.org</u> and select *Navigation Charts* from the *Most Requested Links* box.

### LOCKING THROUGH IN A CANOE!



August 17<sup>th</sup> 2013 marked the 4<sup>th</sup> annual FLOATZILLA event on the Mississippi River in the Quad City area. Approximately 1600 paddlers gathered on the Mississippi River to participate in the large float. This year nearly 500 of these paddlers made it safely through the lock at Locks and Dam 15 in Rock Island, IL. The rangers who assisted with the event focused on safety by reminding everyone about wearing life jackets and the importance of staying away from the hazards in the river like dams and lateral walls. Paddlers ended their trip by gathering in a large flotilla for an attempt at a world record.

### NATIONAL PUBLIC LANDS DAY EVENT SCHEDULED

This year marks the 20th anniversary of National Public Lands Day (NPLD) which is the nation's largest, single-day volunteer effort for public lands. In 2012, about 175,000 volunteers worked at 2,206 sites in every state, the District of Columbia and in many U.S. territories. 2012 was the biggest NPLD in the history of the event.

NPLD volunteers:



- Collected an estimated 23,000 pounds of invasive plants
- Built and maintained an estimated 1,500 miles of trails
- Planted an estimated 100,000 trees, shrubs and other native plants
- Removed an estimated 500 tons of trash from trails and other places
- Contributed an estimated \$18 million through volunteer services to improve public lands across the country

This year you can be part of National Public Lands Day by helping out at Blanding Landing Recreation area on Saturday, September 28th from 9:00 AM - 2:00 PM. # **Mississippi River Visitor Center News**

#### **BUTTERFLIES HATCHED AND RELEASED**

Recently the staff at the Mississippi River Visitor Center collected nine black swallowtail (*Papilio polyxenes*) caterpillars. These small green caterpillars were housed in a special enclosure inside the Visitor Center and feed fresh dill and carrot tops until all nine had transformed into their chrysalis stage. These caterpillars/butterflies are common species in the



Midwest and can easily be found living feeding on plants in your garden. They form their chrysalis on any solid surface including

branches and twigs. After a couple weeks the butterflies began to emerge. Metamorphosis was complete and one by one each butterfly was released into the native prairie plantings outside of the Visitor Center. There were one or two butterflies that hatched each day so many different visitors





got to participate in the releasing of each new hatchling. The wide open

space along the river with native vegetation is the perfect spot for these butterflies to be released into the wild.

### LAST SCHEDULED TOUR OF LOCK AND DAM #16 FOR THE SEASON

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Mississippi River Project invites the public to enjoy a tour of Lock and Dam #16 on September 1, 2013 at 2:00 PM, weather permitting. Lock and Dam #16 is located off 102nd Ave West on the Illinois side of the Mississippi River about one mile upstream from the bridge in Muscatine, IA. Participants will be presented with a history of the Upper Mississippi River system, how the river system operates and the process it takes to move a barge through a lock. The tour is capped off with a walk on the lock structure. Walking is a part of the tour, so participants must wear shoes with enclosed toes and an enclosed back (tennis shoes are best). Advance reservations are required as group size is limited. Please allow approximately one hour to complete the tour. ## **Quincy Ranger Station News**

As we head into early fall, the Quincy Park Rangers would like to invite you to come out and enjoy a day of kayaking and canoeing down the beautiful Mississippi River. The second annual Quincy 5-Miler will be held at 11 AM on Saturday, September 21st. The race is 5 miles long and begins at the Canton Chute Recreation Area just North of Quincy, IL. The paddlers will traverse down the river enter the "cut-through" and before winding down the Quincy Bay and finishing at the South Side Boat Club. The Quincy Park Rangers will be providing Boat Patrol in the area of the event on



race day. Last year, there were over 75 paddlers involved in the event!

On Sunday, September 22nd, the "Bear Creek Grunt" will be held at the Bear Creek Recreation area, which is a few miles northwest of Ursa, IL. This race is for those outdoor enthusiasts that did not get enough adventure with the 5-Miler. The final race is approximately 15 miles long and will follow the East Chute of the Mississippi River before going through the "cut-through" and finishing at the same location as the previous day's race.
